## Study of Knox Case Ordered

Pasadena, Calif. —(U.P.)—The much publicized transfer of quarterback Ronnie Knox from California to UCLA will be investigated by Pacific Coast Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt.

The PCC ordered Schmidt to look into the Knox case yesterday as it closed its annual winter meeting here.

Conference spokesman Prof. H. P. (Dick) Everest, of Washington, said the talented young sophomore's case would be handled like any other involving eligibility. Ronnie, a freshman star at Cal last season, played with the Bruin ineligibles this year.

**Step-Father Charges**  
 He transferred to UCLA amid charges by his step-father, Harvey Knox, a Hollywood nader-dasher, that Cal did not live up to promises made in getting Ronnie to enroll.

Schmidt will report to the conference May 22 in Portland, Ore. on his investigation of young Knox, who will be eligible to play for the Bruin varsity next year.

The PCC also decided to put off consideration of its 1956 ban on spring football practices. As the rule now stands, the spring workouts will be illegal after 1955—but there has been much pressure for revoking the ban.

## Jim Norris Sees Destruction Plot

New York —(U.P.)—James D. Norris Jr., president of the International Boxing Club, said Thursday that charges he "fixed" two fights several years ago were a "character assassination plot designed to destroy boxing and the International Boxing Club."

Norris was referring to a copyrighted story written for Sports Illustrated magazine by former heavyweight boxer Harry Thomas, in which Thomas said Norris helped to fix the bouts he lost by knocking out to Max Schmeling at Madison Square Garden, Dec. 13, 1937, and to Tony Galento in Philadelphia, Nov. 14, 1938.

 Portland —(U.P.)—Some uncanny shooting by Cal Poly added up to an 88-75 victory for the Mustangs over Lewis & Clark last night. Cal Poly shot 35 times in the first half and canned 16 shots to move out by 41-29 at halftime. The Mustangs seemed to be able to pull away from the Pioneers at will. ## Conservation Materials Available for Teachers

Portland — Oregon school teachers seeking materials for teaching units on conservation can get free of charge a booklet entitled, "Inexpensive Written Materials on Conservation for Oregon schools."

This booklet, listing many materials available for the asking or for a slight fee, is available from the Oregon State Game Commission or Dr. Donald Stiller, supervisor of science, Portland public schools.

The 22-page list was compiled by the Oregon Division of the Izaak Walton League of America and won a national award for the division last year. Included is material on conservation of soil, water, wildlife, and forests, and in listing the material, the league has given much pertinent information on each item. Such things as the author, contents, and appropriate grade level are included.

## Boros Takes Lead in Miami Tourney

Miami, Fla. —(U.P.)—A hand injury makes it a little difficult for Julius Boros to grip his golf clubs but the Mid-Pines, N. C., pro had a good grip on the Miami Open tournament lead today as the field began the second round.

Boros, wearing a bandage over his right thumb which he injured seriously enough to require four stitches a week ago, fired a four-undar-par 66 in Thursday's opening round to go a stroke up on his nearest pursuers in the cumbersome 161-man field.

Three pros were tied for second place in the \$10,000 tourney with 67's. The three were five-time winner and pre-tourney favorite Sam Snead, Ted Kroil of New Hartford, N.Y., and dark horse Joe Brown of Des Moines, Iowa.

## Glickman Seeks Grid Franchise

Portland —(U.P.)—Harry Glickman, youthful promoter of professional football games here, said today he has applied for a professional football franchise for Portland.

"I firmly believe that Portland is ready for professional football on a league basis," Glickman said.
