

Dr. Sheppard Tells of Hearing Wife Cry Out on Night of Murder

Cleveland—(U.P.)—Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard recited calmly to his wife-murder jury today his story of hearing her cry his name in the night and dashing to her rescue only to be knocked out by her slayer.

Sitting prayerlike and with his eyes closed in the witness chair, Dr. Sheppard told how he found his wife, Marilyn, 31, so badly beaten in her bed that he thought "it was all a terrible nightmare or dream."

"I was horrified, I was shaken beyond explanation, and I felt that maybe I'd wake up, that maybe this was all a terrible nightmare or dream," the boyish-faced defendant said.

In Deep Sleep
The 30-year-old osteopathic brain surgeon said the day of July 3 had been an exhausting one for him, and he was in a deep sleep when he first heard the cry sometime after midnight on the chilly, windy morning of July 4.

"I was awakened by her cries," he continued. "My drowsy recollection was stimulated to go to Marilyn, which I did as soon as I could navigate."

"I tried to go to Marilyn and was intercepted, and I grappled and felt I was struck from behind, and my recollection was cut off."

He said he realized he had been hurt.

"I came to some sort of consciousness and I looked at my wife's bed."

Chief defense counsel William J. Corrigan asked him to tell the jury what he saw.

"She was in a very... condition," he said. "She'd been badly beaten. I felt that she was gone."

Dr. Sheppard said he heard a noise downstairs.

He went downstairs to the living room where "I visualized a form." The form was between the front door and the yard, which drops off abruptly to the Lake Erie Beach.

Grappling With Man

Dr. Sam said he went down the stairway to the landing of his boathouse.

"I descended as rapidly as I could, I lunged or lurched and grappled with this individual from behind. I felt as though I grasped an immovable object of some type. I was conscious only of a choking, twisting sensation."

"That's all I can remember until I came to a vague sensation in the water or at the water's edge."

He said the form's clothing appeared dark from behind. The man had "a good-sized head with a bushy appearance to the top—the hair, that is."

He said it was light enough by the time he regained consciousness the second time to see the Huntington pier to the east of his property.

"I remember as I finally came to enough sensation to get to my feet, I finally staggered up the stairway."

"As I recognized that this was my home, I entered and came to the realization that I had been struck. I was fearful for Marilyn, but I can't say that then I remember I had seen her the first time."

Dr. Sheppard closed his eyes as if in prayer again and clasped his hands: "I saw she had been terribly beaten."

Corrigan asked him to describe his feelings at that moment.
