Washington Tops Brigham Young

Provo, Utah — (U.P.) — Washington's bustling band of Huskies ruined Brigham Young's home basketball debut Friday night as they laced the Cougars, 64-44, before 4,463 fans.

Washington combined a fast-breaking offense with a tight defense to put the Cougars in a hole and rolled to a 40-18 half-time lead.

The Huskies, who hit 36 percent of their field goals, had five players score 10 or more points as they completely crushed the slow-starting BYU team.

It was the worst defeat handed the Cougars on their own court in the last three years.

Buckeye Back Sprains Knee

Columbus, O. — (U.P.) — Fullback Hubie Bobo suffered a sprained knee Saturday at the next to last football practice here in preparation for the Rose Bowl game with Southern California.

Trainer Ernie Biggs said the painful sprain would sideline the Chaucer-Dover, O., back for at least a week, indicating he would not workout Thursday when the Buckeyes wind up home drills. The Ohio State gridders fly to California Dec. 18.

The hard-running fullback was hit by two defenders who closed in from opposite sides after he had picked up 10 yards over right guard.

Layne to Face Neuhaus Tonight

Dortmund, Germany — (U.P.) — Heinz Neuhaus, German and European heavyweight champion, will face the ring at 9 p.m. (noon PST) tonight the 4 to 1 favorite to defeat Rex Layne of Ogden, Utah, in their 10-round bout at the West Falehalle indoor stadium.

Ralph Weiser Fatally Hurt In KF Bout

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Ralph Weiser, a 138-pound fighter from Beatty, Ore., died today of injuries suffered in a main event bout last night with Teddy Hall of Seattle.

Hall, 133, scored a technical knockout in the ninth round of a scheduled ten-rounder. A succession of body and head punches by Hall staggered Weiser and a short right to the jaw put the Beatty fighter down. He got up at the count of nine but fell forward unconscious.

Weiser was taken to a Klamath Falls hospital. Doctors said he suffered a cerebral hemorrhage. He died at 5 a.m.

Ralph Weiser, Beatty Indian, who died of injuries suffered in a Friday boxing bout at Klamath Falls, had fought in Medford on a number of occasions both as an amateur and a professional.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The San Francisco Forty Niners wound up a disappointing league season Saturday by squeezing out a 10-7 victory over the last place Baltimore Colts on a slippery field.

A crowd of 26,956 who came out to see the nationally televised contest watched the listless locals move into at least a temporary tie with the Chicago Bears for second place in the final standings of the NFL's Western conference. The Bears end their campaign today against Detroit's champion Lions.

A 10-yard field goal by Gordie Soltau in the second period was the actual difference in the scoring. It was Soltau's only goal in four attempts while quarterback Gary Kerkorian of the Colts missed another four, the last coming with two minutes to go and the ball on the Forty Niner 26.

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Determine Gets Money Crown

Albany, Calif. — (U.P.) — Determine, the little grey colt who never quits, came from far back Saturday to win the Golden Gate handicap and the money-winning championship of America for 1954.

Spotting five rivals in the mile and one-eighth race from five to 21 pounds, Determine finished three and one half lengths ahead of Poona 2nd and Jockey Ray York holding the Kentucky Derby champion in as he crossed the wire. The time was 1:50 3-5 on a real muddy track.

The victory was worth \$15,300 to owner Andrew J. Crevolin and brought Determine's winnings this year to \$328,880—exactly \$14,000 ahead of King Ranch's inactive High Gun.
