



S-D DAY FATALITY—Emmet G. Fallon Area Warned It Faces More Earthquakes in Future

Fallon, Nev.—(U.P.)—A Navy geologist warned residents of the Fallon area, jolted this year by three strong earthquakes, that they probably can expect more tremors for some time to come.

The geologist, Gladstone Marchand of San Bruno, Calif., said the appearance of the region around Fallon "indicates a long history of faulting."

"It's reasonable to assume that we can expect movement along

these faults in future years," he said.

Centered in Fallon Area

The latest series of shocks began at 3:09 a.m. PST yesterday, shaking California, Nevada and parts of Oregon, Idaho and Utah. The quake was centered in the Fallon area, which suffered extensive damage in two shocks last summer.

A strong aftershock rocked the San Francisco Bay Area at 11:10 p.m. for several seconds. Residents of Oakland, along the eastern shore of San Francisco Bay, said it was particularly strong. A resident of Hayward said the tremor "really shook the house."

In Pasadena, Dr. Charles F. Richter, head of the seismological laboratory of the California Institute of Technology, said aftershocks from yesterday's quake "will be practically a dime a dozen."

Marchand said the shocks were caused by a four-foot drop of millions of tons of earth and rock on the east side of the Clan Alpine mountain range, 47 miles east of Fallon. He said the major zone involved was about a mile wide.

He said cracks in the earth, some several feet wide, extend

for miles in a north-south direction.

"I feel sure that Thursday's displacement was more severe than that of last July," he said.

However, yesterday's quake caused only minor damage because the earth rolled rather than jarred. Seismographs measured it at between 6.75 and slightly more than 7 on the Richter scale of 10.

It caused plaster to fall from ceilings and walls, toppled chimneys, caused highways to drop and tumbled boulders on to roads.

Placerville, Calif.—(U.P.)—A stocky woman in slacks and dark glasses held up the Bank of America for \$737 here yesterday and escaped in a car with Oregon plates.

The woman, armed with a "stubby" pistol handed a note to teller Jan Shirk reading "give me the cash and keep quiet." Mrs. Shirk sounded the alarm as the woman left and Robert Frazer, another bank employee grabbed her as she raced toward her car. The woman twisted free shouting "Help! Police! This man is annoying me."

No trace of the getaway vehicle, a late model station wagon, was found in an afternoon roadblock in northern California.

EOC Young GOPs To Keep Affiliation

La Grande — (U.P.)—Eastern Oregon College Young Republicans will not withdraw from the state group, Arthur Hartgraves, chairman, said today.

Hartgraves said "it is our intent to remain and carry on true Republicanism within the federation." But he added that the decision did not mean a change in the EOC attitude toward the "high command" of the state federation.

Controversy between the college club, third largest in Oregon, and the parent state group began when Hartgraves charged that EOC's club was not invited to the state convention.

Hartgraves said "we still sincerely feel that there has been a series of actions between the immediate past officers and the newly-elected officers, tending to turn the Federation into a private club where they can rule unchallenged as spokesmen for all Young Republicans in Oregon."

He announced that plans were being made to hold a conclave of all Young Republicans east of the Cascades some time in the spring.

Election Ordered for Unlicensed Seamen

Washington — (U.P.)—The National Labor Relations Board today ordered a union representation election among all unlicensed West Coast seamen to settle an organizing fight between the AFL Seafarers' Union and Harry Bridges' Independent Longshoremen's Union.

The board decision, an unanimous one, granted the AFL union's request for a single election among all the 6000 unlicensed seamen. The board dismissed Bridges' request for a separate election among stewards, who make up a large part of the unlicensed personnel.

The election is to decide whether all the unlicensed personnel are to be represented by the AFL Seafarers, Bridges' union, the National Union of Marine Cooks and Stewards, also independent, or no union. It is to be held as soon as arrangements can be made.

Roseburg Man Dies in Collision With Train

Roseburg — (U.P.)—John Wesley Scott, 40-year-old lumber employee, was killed instantly yesterday afternoon when his freight train, Coroner L. L. Powers reported.

Scott is survived by his widow and four children.

Sturbridge, Mass.—(U.P.)—A meeting house built by the Quakers in 1796 in nearby Bolton was rededicated at Old Sturbridge Village recently. The building was disassembled and moved the 30 miles to Sturbridge "to establish a suitable memorial to the faith, fortitude and devotion of those who built and maintained it."



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
