Wasco DA To Seek Release of Knowles

The Dalles — (U.P.) — Wasco County District Attorney Donald Heisler left for Sacramento, Calif., Saturday to ask for the release of a federal prisoner to face second degree murder charges in The Dalles.

Heisler said the prisoner, Robert C. Knowles, 47, of Bangor, Me., was indicted Thursday for the slaying of Albert C. Stuart, 58, in 1953. Knowles was held in Sacramento while awaiting sentencing on federal auto theft charges.

Knowles, while awaiting trial on the auto charge, confessed to the slaying of Stuart, a harvest hand. He was brought to Oregon last weekend and led state police to a shallow grave along Highway 97 near Shaniko containing the body of a man believed to be Stuart.

Heisler said he planned to appear in federal court today to ask for Knowles' release.

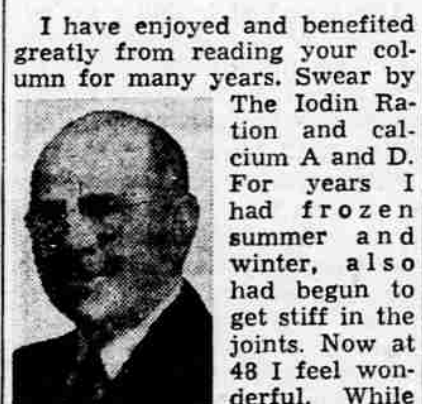

Your Health and Its Care

The nannies don't give a—they don't care what medicine it is, if any, as long as its administered by injection. That way they imagine it goes right to the seat of the trouble, instead of traversing the alimentary tract and taking the roundabout way to get there. Besides, if the stuff costs \$3.75 to \$7 a shot it must be pretty powerful, what?

Relief of distressing frequent hot flashes, from which some women suffer for years, has been obtained with remarkable celerity in many instances from improving calcium metabolism.

That means primarily including in the everyday diet several foods of high calcium content—milk, cheese, egg (yolks), peas, beans, greens, peanuts, nuts—and supplementing the diet with calcium and vitamin D.

Some readers may have noticed that I recommend calcium and D for many different complaints. That is so—but, heck, if you want to know Ca and D is really good for, slip me a clean, negotiable quarter with stamped self-addressed envelope for Little Lesson No. 26, *The Calcium Shortage*. By the time you get half way through the booklet you'll probably sit back, wipe your spectacles and murmur: "It's just as I thought—'O! Doc is completely off his rocker."

But as a faithful follower of Hippocrates I must tell you what I believe is true even if I get committed for it. I believe Sherman was right—H. C. Sherman about the deficiency of calcium in modern refined American food. And I believe that a great many common complaints in Yankeeland are the manifestations of malnutrition for insufficient daily intake of calcium.

If you wonder why I include vitamin D with calcium, it is because sunshine vitamin D pro-

notes assimilation and utilization, if it is not essential for assimilation and utilization of calcium and phosphorus. And I call it sunshine vitamin because you can manufacture your own by exposing your skin to direct sunshine or to diffuse daylight (in the shade).

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
 Nocturnal Leg Cramps
 I found out by experience that if one takes plenty of milk and egg daily the nocturnal leg cramps will vanish. At least a pint of milk and one egg daily. (Mrs. E. J.)

Answer—That's a minimum requirement, perhaps, but let's say 1½ pints (three glasses) of milk and two eggs daily would be better. The milk is the best source of calcium, and egg yolk the best source of vitamin D in the ordinary everyday diet. Send stamped self-addressed envelope and ask for pamphlet *ADULT TESTANY*—which commonly manifests itself as painful cramps in legs at night.

Wife has mitral stenosis. I asked the doctor about using diathermy (electro-coagulation) treatment for her infected tonsils, and he sneeringly said: "So you are one of Dr. Brady's readers?" "Yes, I am," I told him. "Have you any objections?" and I walked right out. . . (S. W. J.)

Answer—I know how irksome it is—I served 18 years at honest practice before I turned quack. The doctor might have taken a facetious or whimsical attitude and retained the client's confidence, had he exclaimed: "By golly, so you too, read 'O! Doc Brady's pieces'." Certainly electro-coagulation would be the method of choice for treating infected tonsils in a patient with valvular defect—and I doubt that any physician of standing will venture to refute it.

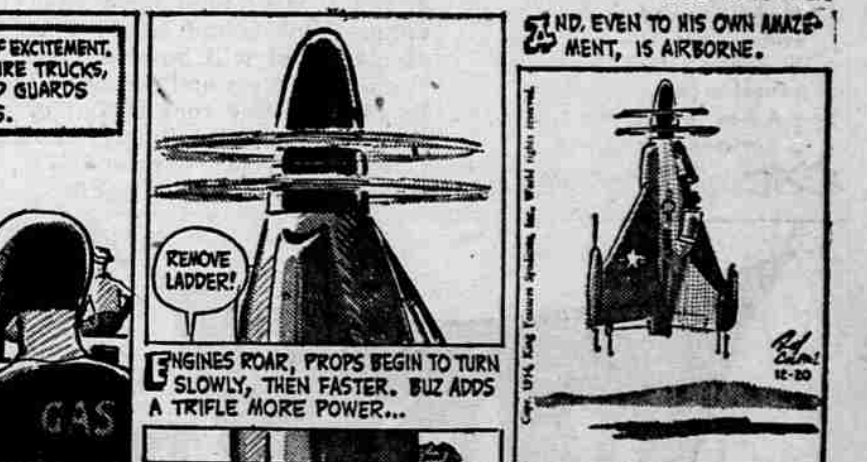
