Weyerhaeuser Plans New Paper Mill

Longview, Wash. (U.P.)—The Weyerhaeuser Timber Company says it plans to build a new paper mill here in a joint venture with Rhineland Paper Company of Rhineland, Wis.

The firm will be called the R-W Paper company. Wood pulp will be supplied by Weyerhaeuser's plant here.

The announcement followed a disclosure by Weyerhaeuser Wednesday of plans to build a chemical plant here to produce chlorine and caustic soda for use in pulp mill operations.

Construction on both projects is planned in the near future.

Eastern U.S. Hit By Snow Flurries

Sharply colder temperatures accompanied light snow flurries in the eastern third of the nation today, with freezing weather extending as far south as Florida.

Most of the rest of the country, however, reported slowly rising temperatures, with readings well above normal in the Northern Plains states and the Rocky Mountain region.

Weekend snows turned highways slick and were blamed in part for a high traffic toll.

In Illinois alone, 17 were reported killed in auto accidents, the worst record in the nation.

Snow was piled five to ten inches deep over most of Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan, and the rest of the Midwest was blanketed with one to two inches.

Author James Hilton Reported Near Death

Long Beach, Calif. (U.P.)—Author James Hilton, 54, in critical condition and near death from an unidentified infection, was reported in "an even weaker condition" today.

A spokesman at Seaside Memorial Hospital, where Hilton has been hospitalized since Nov. 21, said the author "grew worse during the night."

The novelist, who wrote such famed books as "Lost Horizon" and "Goodbye Mr. Chips," was in an oxygen tent and in a semi-conscious state.

Western Nations Hail U.N. Session as One of Great Success

United Nations, N. Y. (U.P.)—Western democracies today hailed the United Nations general assembly for starting President Eisenhower's Atoms for Peace plan on the road to reality, trying to free 11 American airmen jailed in China and setting up disarmament negotiations.

The 9th annual meeting of the assembly was one of high drama and personal tragedy, capped by Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld's proposal to go to Red China and the death of Andrei Y. Vishinsky, the Soviet Union's venom-tongued chief delegate.

Allies Solidly United
The western allies were more solidly united than ever before, from the viewpoint of the western democracies, the successes of the 9th annual meeting of the 60-nation world parliament which ended last night were many. Its failures were few.

The high point of the entire assembly was the debate on the prisoners, with thirty-four-year-old British Delegate Anthony Nutting making what delegates

agreed was the greatest speech of this meeting and one of the best of any assembly.

"These airmen are not just members of the American Air Force," Nutting said. "They are soldiers of the world organization sent to fight by the will of the U. N."

"Though they can not hear us, we can and must speak for them. Their lives, their freedom, their future, their safety, is our responsibility—the responsibility of each and every one of us present here today."

"They went forth to uphold our cause. We must uphold theirs."

Vote Climax of Debate
The debate was climaxed by a vote instructing Hammarskjöld to do all he can to release the men. He promptly arranged a Christmastime meeting with the Chinese Reds in Peiping.

From the Communists viewpoint, this assembly was practically a disaster.

United States Chief Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., said in a statement after the assembly closed:

"... the U. N. knocked down decisively all the various Soviet bloc items, most of which were strongly anti-American. Their score of accomplishment was zero."

"A wonderful session for lovers of freedom throughout the world."

There were 72 items on the assembly's agenda.

They ranged from the atoms for peace plan to a committee report on "customs, ancient laws and practices affecting the human dignity of women."

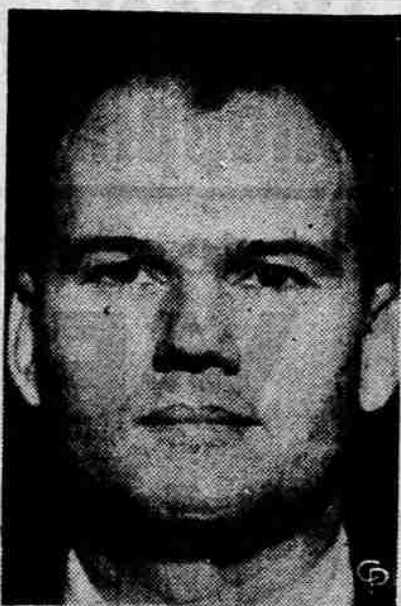
Machinery Started
On the atoms for peace plan, the U. N. got the machinery started toward forming an international atomic energy agency and arranging for a scientific conference on the peaceful use of atomic energy to be held next summer.

A disarmament proposal passed unanimously also delegates the five leading atomic powers to negotiate secretly for reduction of conventional arms and eventual banning of nuclear weapons.

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Inquest Slated Into Train Crash Death

Ontario, Ore. (U.P.)—Malheur County Coroner George Beechler has scheduled an inquest for 2 p.m. today into the traffic death of Albert Roy Barnes, 40, of Nyssa.

Barnes was killed instantly Saturday morning when the car he was driving was struck by a westbound Union Pacific mail and express train at a crossing three miles north of Nyssa, Beechler said.

Barnes was enroute to go duck hunting with his son, Jimmy, 14. The boy was thrown from the car by the impact, but was uninjured. Police said Barnes' vision was apparently obscured by a string of freight cars parked on the Arcadia siding.

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
