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Engineers May Divert Water To Go Under Bridge

Onawa, Ia.—(UP)—A \$2,000,000 bridge that leads nowhere has been hanging half-built over land just west of here for eight years. Now engineers have the go-ahead to spend \$3,000,000 more on the project.

But they say it may take up to \$8,000,000 more to divert the waters of the Missouri river under the span and complete the bridge itself.

Contractors have begun bringing dredges and other heavy equipment here so work can begin next spring.

The Decatur, Neb., bridge commission built a 750-foot west end approach and 840-foot main span

in 1946 when it looked as if Congress was going to take action on a 21-year-old navigation project between Omaha, Neb., and Sioux City, Ia.

Under the plan, the river channel would have passed Decatur at the exact spot where the bridge stands.

It was planned that the bridge, whose 1,200-foot east end approach has yet to be built, would connect with a highway running from Decatur to here, a distance of eight miles.

The riverless bridge was built on dry land, where weeds now flourish, to save an estimated \$400,000 in construction costs.

Army engineers say the bridge commission decided to take a "calculated risk" in building the span in the hopes Congress would authorize the planned channel stabilization projects along the Missouri.

But the funds never materialized. Now Congress has appropriated \$3,000,000 for work on the Missouri near the bridge site and Army engineers say they have been assured "top consideration" requests for the remaining \$8,000,000.

The first contract was let to Cunningham-Kiewit Construction Co., Omaha, Neb., early next spring, work will be started on 7,305 feet of dikes and re-vestment work above the bridge to cost \$645,740.

Another contract for similar work will be let soon. Initial work is planned to "tie the river down," and the actual switch of the channel is not expected to come until later stages of the project.

Plans for Hospital Not Just a 'Dream', C of C Members Told

A new hospital being considered here to serve a southern Oregon and northern California population area, of which Medford is the center, "is not just something to dream about," Glenn Jackson told a roundtable meeting of Jackson County Chamber of Commerce members Monday at the Jackson hotel.

The chamber of commerce and Medford Hospital association have been studying the possibility of expanding hospital facilities here to better meet the needs of the area. Jackson has participated in much of the preliminary work.

About Half Committed About half of the money which would have to be raised locally for construction of a hospital has been committed with no strings attached, Jackson reported. It is figured that \$1,275,000 altogether would have to be raised here.

A Stanford Research Institute study made at the request of the chamber has estimated conservatively that cost of an adequate facility would be about \$1,770,000. It brought out that one-third of the construction cost, about \$495,000 in assistance, reasonably can be expected from the federal government through the Hill-Burton act.

Application Made Jackson said that the association has made preliminary application to the Hill-Burton people for funds. Mentioning that it was felt that construction of a new hospital would be better than expanding the present Community Hospital, Jackson stated that researchers came up with a "feasible project."

Once such a facility will be abandoned, he said. The research project, the speaker reported, brought out the growing importance of this area "from the viewpoint of distributors." Mills here "saved" In other discussion A. A. Lausmann, general manager of Kogap Lumber industries, pointed out that lumber industry strikes to the north actually saved some mills in this area "from the scrap heap."

Mills, he said, put on more shifts and ran more hours. Lausmann reported that Southern Pacific company had reported that shipments of lumber from Jackson and Josephine counties for one month were 50 per cent above the year before.

He predicted a banner year in 1955 for the lumber business. There may be price recessions, according to Lausmann, but payroll and volume should not be much different. Yule Business Good Leonard Anderson, vice-president of Commercial Finance corporation, observed that finance companies appear to be operating about 20 per cent off, but that bankers interviewed indicated about the same concerning loans. His observations appeared to back up statements from merchants last week that Christmas business here is good. The people who would ordinarily borrow at this time of year are working and don't need the loans, he indicated.

Fred Robinson, Medford clothing merchant, reported 350 cars daily using the new parking lot on South Front st., north of Main st. The lot has space for 100 cars at one time. Lausmann, also reported expansion at Kogap through addition of a gang sawmill. It has made possible the cutting of a lot of timber otherwise lost, including windthrown timber. The operation has added 22 persons to the payroll.
