Commercial Attitude
Spoils Gift-Giving

Many people, it is true, give gifts with the idea that they will be "paid back." A bride-to-be writes:

(Q) "I am to be married in the near future. My father and I both feel that a wedding reception is an unnecessary expense, and we would prefer not to have one. But my mother would like to have a small reception at the house after the wedding to which a few dozen relatives, friends and neighbors have been invited. She wants the reception for only one reason—gifts. We are not getting married to get gifts; we are getting married because we love each other. Mother says I have given gifts to lots of girls and I have a right to expect gifts in return. She gives a gift with the thought of getting it back. I don't. I give because it makes others happy to receive, and that, in turn, makes me happy. Should we humor my mother and let her have a reception for us after the wedding?"

(A) I, personally, think a small reception, to which you invite the people you know best, is a nice finishing touch to a wedding. It gives these people a chance to wish you happiness in your married life, a chance they would not have if you left for your wedding trip immediately after the church ceremony.

taken on the reason for the reception. It would certainly give a "commercial touch" to your wedding reception if your mother invited people with the idea that they would send you a wedding gift in payment for the food they were to be served. If people are friends of the family, they would likely send you a gift even if you did not have a reception, just as your relatives would. It is true that people often send bigger and more expensive gifts if they attend a wedding reception than if they only go to the church ceremony.

But, that should be an unimportant consideration in making your plans. Try to make your mother see that her emphasis on gifts is spoiling what should be one of the happiest days of your life and emphasize that you want people to come to see you being married so they can share your joy, not so they will feel obligated to send you a gift.

HOME VERSUS HOSPITAL

One reason why there are never enough hospital beds available for the sick is that so many hospital beds are occupied by interlopers, such as individuals who enter the hospital just for a rest or maybe to have what some call a "check-up" or for "observation"—you see it is so much more impressive when the doctor studies or examines the patient in hospital with interns, nurses and other characters in the act than the study or examination would be in the patient's home or in the doctor's office.

And if there is anything that impresses the Yankee Westsacre it is just that kind of show. It is more or less standard in the movies, notably in the imposing scenes televised by Medic.

A large group of interlopers in hospital beds are normal, healthy young women who imagine it is safer to go to the hospital to have a baby. It isn't. Home is the safest place to have a baby. There are no statistics prove whether home or hospital delivery is the safer, but from what I have seen of both, as intern, as private practitioner in country and in city, and as attending physician on a hospital staff, I am convinced that home is the safest place to have a baby.

Indeed, I could make a good case for home delivery by quoting reports of experiences of young women who have been delivered in hospital.

Hospital delivery is not so bad if the institution is out of the nineteenth century, that is, if natural childbirth or rooming-in has been adopted.

Mrs. C. B. W. writes: "I have three children, two born at home, that I nursed; one, born in hospital, that I could not nurse. I began nursing the first two within two or three hours after they were born. But in the hospital they bring your baby in only 24 hours after delivery,

Police Officer Holds Censorship Power

Holyoke, Mass. — (U.P.) — Police in this Western Massachusetts city make a habit of reading comic books.

Every day except Sunday an officer is detailed to visit the warehouse of the Holyoke News Co. to check on incoming comic books, pocket books and other literature available to teenagers. If the books do not meet the approval of the officer, they are not sent to local newsdealers.

The censorship started Aug. 9 with the full approval and cooperation of the News Company's officials in an effort to find a way of halting distribution of crime and horror.

Shipping Point Inspections of Perishables Drop

Salem—(U.P.)—Shipping point inspections of perishables in November totaled 3762 cars, a drop from the 4007 a year earlier, according to the State Department of Agriculture.

Movement of Oregon fruits and vegetables under inspection from July 1 to Nov. 30 reached 14,214 carloads, down 371 cars from the same period last year. Smaller movement of potatoes and pears this season is largely responsible for the shrinkage over last year. November potato shipping point inspections totaled 1594 cars bringing the

1954 total to 8734 cars. The comparative 1953 season movement was 9032 cars.

Pear Movements Down
Movement of pears to Dec. 1 this year totaled 1648 cars, compared with 4125 cars a year ago.

Onion movement for the season amounted to 2278 carloads, up 430 cars from last year. W. L. Close, supervisor of the federal-state shipping point inspection service, said the movement of central Oregon potatoes is ahead of last year. The fall movement from the Klamath basin is running considerably behind last year. Potato

stocks in Malheur county are limited with potato shipping virtually closed down there.
