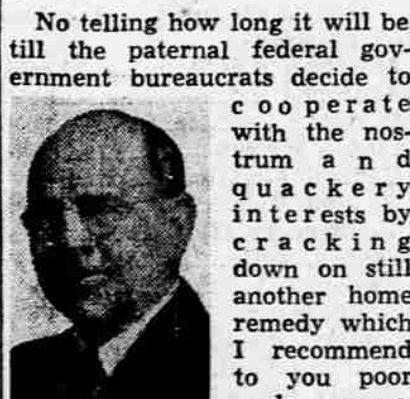

Your Health and Its Care

THE BUREAUCRATS CRACK DOWN

No telling how long it will be till the paternal federal government bureaucrats decide to cooperate with the nostrum and quackery interests by cracking down on still another home remedy which I recommend to you poor souls — namely, chamomile tea. Almost any day now I expect you will begin telling me when you try to replenish your supply of chamomile flowers (English, Roman, German, Hungarian, whatever fancy name you prefer) the druggist now informs you that you'll have to have a prescription, and if you try to make out you needed no prescription when you bought it before he'll squelch you by showing you the keg or can on which is printed "Not to be dispensed without prescription." No, you may as well give up, hand a doctor \$5 and get the prescription as the "law" demands.

I recommend chamomile tea moistened dressings to soothe and speed the healing of leg ulcer — for instructions send stamped, self-addressed envelope and ask for pamphlet Varicose Veins and Ulcer.

In Little Lesson No. 5, Call it C R I (25c) and stamped, self-addressed envelope I recommend household use, for children or adults, of a home made cough medicine, one ingredient of which is citrate of soda (sodium citrate). Many thousands of readers have whipped up and used batches of this for the relief of cough and they have found it highly satisfactory, particularly for young children and for elderly folk with hard cough.

Too many thousands, I'm afraid, and hence too many sales of dope prevented. Anyway, all of a sudden it became difficult or impossible to get sodium citrate — the usual dodge, printed on the can the familiar warning "To be sold only on prescription." Yet this same dangerous chemical, sodium citrate, was for many years used in modifying milk for infant feeding — one to two grains of the salt was added to each ounce of milk used in the mixture, to prevent the formation of large hard curds. Although this practice has been superseded by the use of lime water,

cereal gruels etc., it seems odd that what was harmless enough to feed babies every day has suddenly become unsafe to entrust to plain people to cook up for the occasional use at home.

But wait. You haven't heard the half of it yet. For years I have recommended a corn remedy (notice, please, I do not call it corn cure) which was an old standby long before I began calling folks names, consisting of a solution of 30 grains, about one-half teaspoonful, of salicylic acid in one-half fluid-ounce, (about a tablespoonful) of flexible collodion. This is to be painted on corn, wart or callus once a day for a week, by which time it will have softened so you can wipe it away. Yahbut!

Now a mid-west druggist tells the world that a druggist cannot legally sell 30 grains of salicylic acid without a prescription, and there you are again.

Second Television Course To Begin

Oregon's second television correspondence course — a college "telecourse" presented by the State System of Higher Education in cooperation with Southern Oregon College of education — will go on the air over station KBES-TV Jan. 3 at 7 p.m.

Designed to provide college credit for adult listeners who register, pay authorized fees and complete the regular assignments, the second course will be United States history and government with Dr. Donald MacDougall, assistant professor of social science at SOC, as tele-

vision instructor.

Although the Telecourse program may be viewed by all within range of KBES-TV, the complete correspondence course materials will be provided only to those who register either on a credit or non-credit basis.

Registration fees total \$18 for Oregon residents and \$23 for out-of-state registrants.

Dr. MacDougall, who has been a member of the faculty at Southern Oregon college for more than five years, previously taught at University of California.
