

Black Tornado Wins 2nd Fray From Cleveland Indians 56-40

If the forthcoming Southern Oregon Conference season goes as well for the Black Tornado as did the pre-conference tune-up campaign, there should be a bright 1955 future for the Medford high school basketball team.

Sparked by the all-around play of capable Guards Larry Cople and Frank Rector and coming up again with a hard-driving performance, the blazing Black Tornado last night made it two in a row over the Cleveland Indians of Portland, winning handily, 56 to 40. The Tornado, passing and moving the tough defensive job, was a sharper team than on Tuesday when it whacked the Indians 58 to 48.

Last night's triumph was the sixth straight for Medford and was the seventh in eight pre-league encounters. Medford opens league play against Grants Pass on January 7 and 8. No other pre-conference tangles are slated.

Fast Pace
Cleveland and Medford played at a fast-moving pace last night until Medford turned to control ball in the closing minutes. The Tornado broke away after a furious first quarter to gain leads of 12 points in the second period, 17 in the third and 21 in the fourth.

Score was tied seven times, at 2-all, 4-all, 6-all, 8-all, 10-all, 12-all and 14-all, in the opening panel. Lead switched three times. Two free shots by Jerry Kalapus with 13 seconds left in the stanza put Medford ahead 16 to 14. That was the score at the intermission and the Tornado was on top for keeps.

Second quarter trend was set when Cople cashed in on the tip off. Medford went on to out-score Cleveland 16 to 6 in the canto. Cople, the relaxed sharpshooter, poked in four field goals in the panel, one of them on a steal. Rector connected on a hook and a jumper for four counts. John Foust, flipped in a fielder from the corner and got two free shots to round out the Tornado scoring while smooth Dick Jolley put in a lay-up, Hugh Springer a long one and Eric Peterson two gifts for the visitors.

as the second half opened. After he swished a fielder from the corner, Rector got a longy and Kalapus a free shot while Dave Pearson hit from the field for the Tribe. That made it 39 to 22, Medford's widest spread of the quarter. The Tornado wound up the period 14 points on top, 44 to 28.

Rector sailed in a long hook shot, a long one-hand set shot and a jumper from the key in the early part of the fourth quarter while Kalapus collected a lay-in and free shot. Jolley in the meantime counted up a pair of buckets for Cleveland. Medford held a 53 to 32 advantage.

Medford had a complete reserve team in action the last 1½ minutes and Coach Frank Roelandt used 11 men in all. All 10 members of the Cleveland road squad also saw duty in the fracas.

Cople and Rector, both of whom turned in fine floor games for Medford, were high point men in the contest with 20 and 17, respectively. Cople had nine field goals and Rector seven. Jolley also hit seven from the field and had a 16-point tabulation to pace the Indians.

Jolley Great on Boards
Jolley also was the big man under the boards, picking off 19 rebounds. His teammate, Jay Bashor, was second high in retrieving with 10. Cleveland had the bulge in backboard retrieves 41 to 33 but Coach Roelandt brought out that lost rebounds were a sacrifice paid to give the two Medford sureshots protection.

Medford rebounding was evenly distributed among five men, Kalapus got seven, Glenn Peterson and Bud Kastner each six and Cople and Foust each five.

Medford averaged 420 from the field and 700 at the free line, outgunning Cleveland 21 to 16 from the field and 14 to 8 in gifters. Kastner, Kalapus and Foust turned in some fine defensive work for the Tornado.

Friday Workout
Medford lost some of its height for much of the contest when Peterson was charged with four fouls in the first quarter and was removed near the end of the period. It appeared on at least a couple of occasions that the Tribe was working to get him out of action.

Dick McLaughlin and Foust carried on in Peterson's place. The tall boy returned with 5½ minutes played in the third quarter and did some effective work until reserves took over in the fourth.

Roelandt said that the Tornado will practice Friday and lay off until Monday. Peterson will miss the workout tomorrow. He's drum major for the Medford high band which heads tonight for the Shrine East-West football game at San Francisco.

Romack, Littler Uphold Prestige Of West Coast In Golf Rivalry

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Barbara Romack, the Sacramento siren, joined with Gene Littler, San Diego socker, to uphold the prestige of West Coast golfers in their battle against the world during 1954.

Miss Romack, 114 pound 21-year-old divot expert, was named to the U.S. Curtis cup team, then proceeded to win the national amateur crown to add to her state championship and other important women's titles.

Littler, 1953 National Men's amateur titlist, turned professional and proceeded to set the pro ranks smoldering. He started the year by winning the San Diego Open, "while still an amateur. He turned professional and in the few tournaments in which he was eligible to compete for money, he annexed \$13,912.02 in PGA funds. His best individual effort was to finish second to Ed Furgol in the National Open.

Stole The Show
These two youngsters stole the show from some of the veteran performers. As usual, veterans Lloyd Mangrum and Jerry Barber finished high up the ladder in the money won ranks. Mangrum ranked fifth and sixth on the U.S. Ryder Cup team.

Determine Big News in Horse Racing

San Francisco — (U.P.) — One horse, a gallant little gray campaigner named Determine, was the big story in West Coast horse racing this year.

For the first time since Morvich turned the trick in 1922 a California horse won the Kentucky Derby when Determine came through at 5-1 odds last spring.

Determine earlier had won the Santa Anita and Tanforan derbies and wound up as the leading money winner on the turf for 1954, nosing out High Gun of the East in the final weeks of the campaign by winning the Golden Gate handicaps.

The little son of Alibhai went to the post 15 times during the year, won 10, finished second three times and third twice — a remarkable record for a 900 pound piece of horseflesh. Not only that he won on all kinds of tracks: muddy, fast, sloppy, and slow.

Close Second
California, as usual, ran a close second to New York in the attendance and pari-mutuel handle. A total of 4,653,996 persons went through the turnstiles and they bet \$326,842,150 at the state's six major tracks. Countless other thousands bet many millions more at the county fair races in the state.

Biggest single incident in racing this year was the suspension of Lucky Andy Crevolin, Alhambra auto magnate, who owns the famed "gold dust" twins, Determined and Imbroto.

Crevolin was caught talking when he should have been listening and a national magazine tape-recorded a conversation in which Crevolin admitted that he "didn't always try to win" with his horses on their first time out.

The Horse Racing Commission suspended him for the middle months of the year.

Vancouver, Wash. — (U.P.) — Linfield's Wildcats held the Clark College invitational basketball tournament title today after romping to a 97-78 victory over the host team in the finals last night. Everett Junior College won third place with a 74-63 victory over Yakima JC.

Don Porter of Linfield edged Fletcher Frazier of Clark JC in their scoring battle, 21 points to 17. But Rube Fassen, elder of two speedy Newberg brothers on the Linfield squad, walked off with scoring honors by plunking in 32. His brother, Ted, got 11.

Maglio's Shot Gives NSC Dixie Hoop Toga

John Maglio, a 6-foot "runt" on a team of giants, stood out as one of the biggest men in college basketball today for his pressure-ized push shot that meant a tournament title, an unbeaten record, and a shot at top national honors for North Carolina State.

Maglio, a soph from Haver-town, Pa., dribbled down the court, turned and pushed a shot through the cords with eight seconds left Wednesday night to give State an 85-84 victory over Minnesota in the finals of the Dixie Classic tournament at Raleigh, N. C.

Texas Christian won another big carnival, the Southwest Conference tourney at Houston, and there was semifinal play in several other big holiday shows Wednesday night.

But the State-Minnesota clash topped 'em all in importance, matching the nation's No. 2 team State against the No. 20 team, and in chills.

Shavlik Top Scorer

Six foot-10 Ronnie Shavlik of State took scoring honors with 32 points and was voted the tourney's "Most Valuable Player" while Garmaker and 6-foot-10 Bill Simonovich had 24 each for Minnesota. Simonovich's fouling out with 1:48 left was a key factor in the final result.

In the same tourney, center Dick Hemric of Wake Forest set a new major college scoring record for a four-year career in leading the Deacons to a 93-85 victory over Southern California for third place. Hemric tallied 30 points, his 21st breaking the old record of 2,134 points set from 1946 to 1949 by Jim Lacy of Loyola of Baltimore. Hemric's total now stands at 2,164, exceeded in major colleges only by Frank Selvy of Furman with 2,538 in three seasons.

In other Dixie consolation games, North Carolina upset Duke, 65-52, as Lennie Rosenbluth scored 29, and West Virginia beat Cornell, 79-71, as Rod Hundley scored 24.

O'Neal TCU's Hero
Another sophomore, center Dick O'Neal, was the hero for Texas Christian as his 30 points paced a 77-63 victory over guest team Alabama in the finals of the Southwest Conference tournament. After Alabama held an early 9-8 lead, TCU was in front all the way as it built up a 40-29 halftime margin and breezed home. Bryan Kilpatrick tallied 18 for TCU and Jerry Harper 16 for Alabama.

In Southwest Consolation games, Arkansas took third place by nipping Texas A and M, 74-70, as Buddy Smith scored 24; Southern Methodist trounced Rice, 88-63, despite 23 points by Rice's Terry Telligman; and Murray Bailey set a tourney record with 34 points for Baylor in an 89-75 victory over Texas.

Other Tourney Results
In the other big tournaments: Holiday Festival, New York: Duquesne trounced Dayton, 90-75, in one semi-final as Dick Ricketts set a Madison Square Garden record with 19-for-19 on

free throws and a tourney record of 32 points; and LaSalle also qualified for the Friday night finale by beating UCLA, 85-77, as Tom Gola scored 26 points. In consolation games, Ed Fleming's 29 points paced Niagara to a 91-70 win over Syracuse and Mike Parenti's 23 led St. John's to an 89-77 win over Villanova.

Sugar Bowl, New Orleans: Tommy Heinsohn's 33 points led Holy Cross to an 89-81 semifinal win over Bradley, and John Stephens' 19 points paced Notre Dame to a 66-45 win over Loyola (La.). The final is scheduled tonight.

Big Seven, Kansas City: Bob Reiter's 29 points for Missouri paced a 95-86 win over Oklahoma and Kansas State whipped Iowa State, 70-60, to qualify for tonight's finals. In consolatons, Colorado drubbed Nebraska, 89-47, and Kansas downed California, 65-62.

Andrews Gains TKO Over Smith

Miami, Fla. — (U.P.) — Young Paul Andrews of Buffalo, N. Y., will campaign for a shot at the heavyweight crown, advisor Joe Louis said today, despite Paul's unexpected technical knockout Wednesday night over Boardwalk Billy Smith, top light heavyweight contender.

Andrews, 24, weighed 180½ pounds "in the best condition of my life" when he was credited with four "knockdowns" and a technical kayo at 2:49 of the sixth round in Dinner Key Auditorium.

Smith's Streak
Smith, the 33-year-old "Cinderella man" from Atlantic City, scaled 175 pounds, exactly the light heavyweight limit, as he hit the deck three times and suffered one "technical knockdown" for a defeat that snapped his winning streak at eight straight.

When the unusual technical knockdown occurred in the fifth round Smith turned his back on Andrews and limped to the ropes after getting a hard left hook to the chin.

Referee Eddie Cockman, surprised at ancient Billy's turn-of-tactics, counted "eight" as Smith stood there, and he called it a technical knockdown. Smith then advanced from the ropes and tried to fight as the bell ended the round.

MACKINAW FOR A LAKE
Portland — The clear, cold depths of Wallowa lake will eventually be "home" to thousands of Mackinaw (lake trout) in the egg stage at the Enterprise fish hatchery of the Oregon Game Commission. A first cousin of the eastern brook and Dolly Varden trout, the Mackinaw needs deep, cold water, rocky spawning area, and other bottom loving fishes for its survival, growth, and reproduction. Although growth is slow, the Mackinaw is a hardy character and provides real thrills at 5 pounds or over.

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
