Dianna Bixby's Body Taken To Santa Paula

Santa Paula, Calif. — (U.P.)—The body of famed woman pilot Dianna Bixby, killed when her plane crashed into the sea, was to be returned to her childhood home here today.

Funeral services for the noted aviatrix, a veteran multi-engine pilot of more than 5,000 hours will be arranged by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Converse.

Her grief-stricken husband, pilot Robert Bixby, Monday flew the body of his famous wife in their own DC-3 plane some 600 miles from Baja California to Long Beach, Calif., where they operated an air freight service.

Mrs. Bixby's body was found still strapped to the pilot's seat in the submerged wreckage of her freight carrying converted bomber which crashed Monday near Loreto, on the Peninsula.

Bad Check Passer Placed on FBI List

Washington — (U.P.)—The FBI today put a chronic, nomadic bad check passer on its list of "10 most wanted" fugitives.

He is George Lester Belew, 41-year-old native of Mountain View, Mo., wanted for assaulting a jailer last July in escaping from the Hays, Kan., jail where he was being held on a fraudulent check charge.

The FBI said Belew since 1933 alone has passed bogus checks in 20 states from California to Michigan and from Oregon to Louisiana.

He replaces John Harry Allen on the FBI's fugitive list. Allen, a southwest robber and escape artist, was arrested by local police at Fort Smith, Ark., on Dec. 21.

Belew was born in Mountain View on Oct. 31, 1913. He became an expert in forgery at the age of 17 when, in 1931, he was sentenced to a 10 year term in the Iowa State Reformatory at Anamosa.

Atomic Warhead Tests Possible

Washington — (U.P.)—Atomic warheads for guided missiles may be among the new secret weapons to be put through their paces in atomic tests in Nevada next month.

The Atomic Energy commission announced Sept. 24 that a new series of weapons tests will be held in mid-February at the Frenchman and Yucca Flats proving ground near Las Vegas.

While the AEC did not specify what types of weapons will be tested, there was speculation in informed circles here that the tests will involve guided missiles, possibly including some designed to knock down enemy atom and hydrogen bombers.

December Weather Here Cooler and Drier Than Normal

December in Medford was slightly colder and slightly drier than normal, the weather bureau reported today.

The highest temperature recorded during the month was 61 degrees on the 5th, and the coldest was 17 degrees on the 7th. The monthly average temperature was 38.2 degrees, or .3 of a degree below normal.

Precipitation during the month totaled 2.25 inches, or .88 of an inch below normal. A total of 1.2 inches of snow was measured during the month, and the greatest amount on the ground at one time was 1 inch on the 28th.

Mostly Cloudy
There were four clear days, four which were partly cloudy, and 23 cloudy days, which compared to the 42-year average of two clear days, five partly cloudy and 24 cloudy.

In Ashland, the highest temperature was 60 degrees on the 17th and 18th, and the lowest was 14 on the 27th. Average temperature was 36.6, or .1 of a degree below normal.

Total precipitation there was 1.44 inches, or 1.69 below normal. Greatest amount of snow on the ground was a half inch on the 28th.

In Grants Pass, 56 degrees on the 31st of the month was the highest, and 23 on the 27th was the lowest. Average temperature was 39.3 degrees, or .2 of a degree below normal. Precipitation totaled 4.26 inches, or .97 of an inch below normal.
