**Consumer Specialist Advises Housewives On Good Beef Buys**

If your budget is a bit strained after the holidays, try this tip from Dorothy Sherrill, consumer education specialist with Oregon State college extension service. Select a large beef arm pot roast at the market—about three inches thick. Have the butcher cut the roast into three parts, the center for pot roast, one end sliced through for swiss steak, and the other end cut for stew, chili or beef steak pie.

Housewives will find this a more economical buy than purchasing the cuts separately, Miss Sherrill says.

When you prepare these meat cuts—whether for pot roast, swiss steak or stew, be sure to brown the meat well on a medium heat. Good browning develops flavor and seals in the juices for a finished dish.
