## Third Worst Polio Year During 1954

Washington—(U.P.)—The nation suffered its third worst polio outbreak in 1954.

The Public Health Service said today that 38,734 cases were reported in 1954. That compared with 35,953 in 1953, but was well below the 57,000 recorded in the peak year of 1952. In 1949 second worst year, 42,000 cases were reported.

Florida, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico had unusually high incidences over the 1953 rate, as did Massachusetts, Iowa, Nebraska, Kentucky and Texas.
