

Jacksonville Plans To Seek U.S. Aid For Sewer Survey

Jacksonville — The city council at Jacksonville last week approved a motion to apply for federal aid to finance a planning survey for a city sewer system.

City Recorder B. J. Christianson reported that if a federal agreement were approved, the city would have to repay the survey cost only if the system were installed. The same method was employed under the water system improvement, with the survey cost repaid by the bond issue.

Survey Team Approved
The Corvallis firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merrifield was approved by the council to do the survey engineering.

City Attorney Ervin Hogan told the council that the U. S. hotel deed to the city was now written to give the city clear title for use of the property for rental or other purpose to help pay for its maintenance.

New city officers were sworn in at the meeting. Included were Mayor John Keaveny, Councilmen Arthur Davies, Everett Ravenor and Ray Wilson. Christianson was reappointed city recorder and Anna Coleman, treasurer.

Outgoing Mayor A. C. Van Galder expressed his appreciation to the council and city officers for cooperation during his term of office. Van Galder was appointed mayor in September, 1953, when Albert Hackert resigned to become city superintendent.

Fire Chief Louis Applebaker recommended to the council that the old Bartley residence be condemned as a residence. A four-member committee was named to inspect the premises and report back at the next regular meeting.

Recommendation Of U.S.-Philippines Treaty Scheduled

Washington — (U.P.) — A bilateral Filipino-American treaty on atomic matters will be recommended this month by the Joint Congressional committee on atomic energy, it was learned Saturday.

The accord with the Philippines would be one of 10 such interlocking, bilateral agreements designed to accelerate peaceful applications of atomic energy, Rep. James E. Van Zandt (R-Pa.) told the United Press.

The others recommended, he said, would be with Australia, New Zealand, Thailand, India, Pakistan, Iran, Turkey, Greece and Spain.

Van Zandt was a member of congressional atomic subcommittee which recently toured the ten nations. They conferred in Manila with President Ramon Magsaysay and other top Philippine leaders.

Van Zandt said that the proposed treaties would govern the exchange of atomic information, trainees and materials.

Attorney Willard S. Stanton said the anti-McCarthy group will either seek a re-hearing of its conviction of a week ago or appeal directly to the state supreme court.

Policy on Courtroom Photos Gets Study

Portland — (U.P.) — Courtroom news photography drew the attention of Oregon district judges at the annual association convention here Friday, but the jurists did not take a final stand.

Both sides of the controversial subject were presented by district judges during a discussion of Canon 35 of the American Bar association, which prohibits picture-taking in court sessions.

The judges also considered donning robes for court appearances, but left the choice up to individual courts. The association resolved to seek enabling legislation to extend parole board services to district courts in misdemeanor cases.

Flying Finn Twins Must Go To Prison

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The Ninth U. S. Court of Appeals has upheld the one-year sentences giving the famed flying Finn twins, Charles and George, who were convicted of interfering with a federal officer.

The court said it was "an outrage to the dignity of the United States" when the 40-year-old twins handcuffed U. S. Attorney Laughlin E. Waters in front of the Biltmore Hotel in Los Angeles last Jan. 21.

In upholding the one year sentence Friday, the court said, "persons are not to be lightly permitted to reduce the majesty of the U. S. government, whose officer Waters was, to the level of a carnival."

"It should be said that during the outrage, which it was, the U. S. attorney comforted himself with dignity," the court said.
