Oregon Staters Lick WSC, Huskies Rap Idaho in ND; Trojans Subdue California

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Oregon State, revitalized by the first appearance this season of seven-foot, three-inch center Wade "Swede" Halbrook, opened the defense of its Northern Division basketball crown here Friday night by defeating Washington State 70-58.

The Beavers trailed the visiting Cougars until Halbrook's entry midway through the first period. The all-coast center quickly sank a field goal to put Oregon State ahead 24-23. The Beavers increased their lead, and were ahead 29-24 as the half ended.

Ashland—Ashland high hopes in the Southern Oregon Conference basketball race were boosted Friday night by a 49 to 48 nod over the Klamath Falls Pelicans. Gene Parent's free shot with three seconds to play provided the margin.

The Grizzlies were never behind in the tense tangle but they were tied three times 23-all at halftime and 46-all and 48-all in the closing moments. Ashland's widest margin was six points. First quarter tally was 11 to 9 and after three chukkers it was 37 to 34.

D'Olivio Knots Tussle A field shot by Dave D'Olivio knotted the fray at 46 each. Jerry Mickle put Ashland back in front 48-46 with two gift tosses. Then D'Olivio came through again. Parent missed the first and made the second of two free shots in the final seconds.

Ashland defense was tough and Klamath did not hit well from far out. The Grizzlies themselves did not do too well on outside shots until the last half. It was actually free shots, however, which won the combat. Klamath outscored Ashland from the field 20 to 14. Parent, high scorer with 16, got 10 at the free line.

Jim Sutherland was the backboard workhorse for the Grizzlies, helping the Ashlanders much against the tall Pelican crew.
