Negro Contralto Given Ovation By Metropolitan Opera Audience

New York — (U.P.) — Marian Anderson was hailed today as a new star for her dramatic operatic debut with the Metropolitan Opera company.

The Negro contralto, first of her race to sing a leading role with the 71-year-old company, received a loud and prolonged ovation from the "standing room only" audience when she appeared Friday night as the sorceress, Ulrica, in a revival of Verdi's "Un Ballo in Maschera" Masked Ball.

Miss Anderson, 47, appeared in only one scene—the second of the first act—and sang her role with warmth and feeling.

Paul Henry Lang, music critic for the New York Herald Tribune, said "It was a pleasure to see Marian Anderson, the distinguished Negro contralto, on our great operatic stage; an honor—and a privilege for us—long overdue."

"Miss Anderson, who was acclaimed with frenetic applause, is to be commended especially for the excellent part she took in the complicated ensembles."

Olin Downes of the New York Times said "History was made last night when Miss Anderson sang for the first time in the Metropolitan Opera House and

for the first time in opera on any stage."

Downes said Miss Anderson's role was a difficult one requiring "a dramatic personality as well as sumptuous singing."

"... By her native sensibility, intelligence and vocal art, Miss Anderson stamped herself in the memory and the lasting esteem of those who listened... at the end of the act the audience would not have enough of Miss Anderson, recalling her again and again before the curtain."

The all-star cast for Friday night's performance also included Zinka Milanov, Richard Tucker, Leonard Warren, Roberta Peters, Nicolai Moscona and Norman Scott.
