Rice Flour Said Good With Frozen Foods

Flour made from waxy rice helps frozen and canned foods keep their looks when thawed or heated, according to research carried on by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The quartermaster corps now specifies using waxy rice flour in sauces and gravies in the armed forces' precooked frozen meals, as a result of the research. Scientists think using the rice flour may solve other problems of changes in consistency of canned foods, it is reported.

This isn't a sure cure, but it may help, Miss Minden says. Best idea is to use furniture cups under metal furniture when you can.



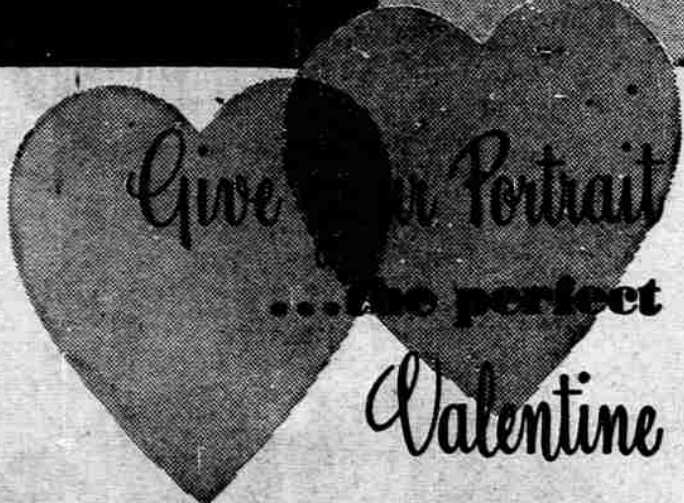

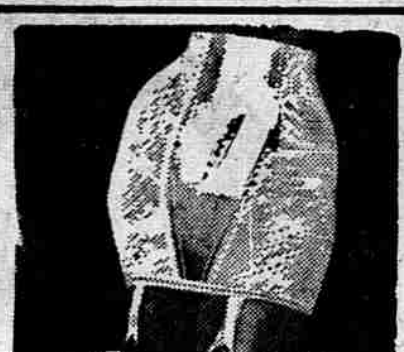
