

# Brucellosis Control Program Studied By County Livestock Men

Jackson county beef cattle growers have taken a federal brucellosis control program under advisement and expect to reach a decision on accepting it at the annual meeting of the Jackson County Stockmen's association in February.

The brucellosis, or Bang's disease, control program was outlined here this week at a meeting held in the county courthouse. The session was called at the request of M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the animal industry section of the state department of agriculture, Salem. Program Outlined

The control program was outlined by Dr. A. G. Beagle, veterinarian in charge of the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry in Portland, and Dr. K. J. Peterson, veterinarian for the state department of agriculture. The two men are scheduled to speak again at the Stockmen's association meeting in February.

The proposed program, under which the federal government would bear all expenses, would be voluntary on the part of the individual stockmen, it was pointed out. The individual owner would be allowed to test none, part, or all of his herd.

**One Restriction**  
The only restriction would be that if any animals in the herd reacted to the test, the owner would have to dispose of them. However, they could be held separately for an agreed period of time to allow the owner to obtain best possible conditions of disposal.

Another provision of the plan would be vaccination, paid for by the federal government, of any heifer calves between 6 and 12 months of age. The program also includes indemnity to own-

ers of up to \$25 per head of commercial unregistered stock, and up to \$50 a head for purebred registered stock.

**County Zones**  
Zones would be set up by the county court, with a veterinarian assigned to each zone. It was noted, for example, that with the five veterinarians now operating in Jackson county, the county would be divided into five zones. It would be possible for the veterinarian assigned to any one zone to ask one of the other veterinarians to work with a herd if that should prove to be desirable.

The veterinarians doing the work would be paid \$2 per herd, plus 50 cents per animal vaccinated.

Although the final decision on accepting or rejecting the plan on a countywide basis is up to members of the county court, they indicated at the meeting that they will wait until members of the Stockmen's association reach a decision, and will then abide by that decision.

**Veterinarians Attend**  
Among those attending the meeting were the five veterinarians, including Dr. George Gitz, Dr. K. C. Farley, and Dr. Stanley Philips, all of Medford; Dr. M. E. Hanwalt, Central Point, and Dr. Walter W. Weller, Ashland.

Members of the Stockmen's association in attendance were Henry Owens, Ashland, president; Herb Carlton, Prospect, vice-president; Jim Miller, Medford, Warren Bayliss, Medford, Frank Preston Jr., Applegate, and Ike Peil, Shady Cove, directors, and W. L. Stewart, Ashland, and Marcus Dey, Prospect, members.

## Northwest Growth In 20 Years Seen

Portland—(U.P.)—The population of the Pacific Northwest will increase by 50 per cent within the next 20 years, according to the director of area development for the Stanford Research Institute.

Charles L. Hamman, in a speech here before the Oregon Building Congress, said the present 5,000,000 population of the Northwest states would grow to 7,800,000 by 1975.

He cited three reasons for the forecast: The Northwest is the last frontier for migration from the east and middlewest; favorable climate, and "amenities" such as recreational facilities.

Hamman asserted that Northwest winters are growing less severe and he predicted that more and more industries would locate in the region because industrialists and workers alike would be attracted by the mild climate and the opportunities for outdoor activities.
