Communist Party Leader on Trial

Chicago — (U.P.) — Communist Party leader Claude Lightfoot went on trial yesterday in the U.S. government's first court attempt to prove that mere membership in the Communist party is a crime.

The trial of the 33-year-old executive secretary of the Illinois Communist party was the first court test of a Smith Act clause which makes it a crime "to become a member of, or affiliate with" any group which teaches, advocates or encourages the violent overthrow of the U. S. government.

Lightfoot was also the first Red leader to face trial alone.

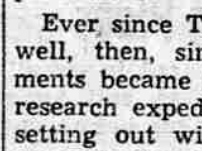
A HALF MILLION DOLLAR JUNKET

An appeal to industrial leaders to research on the cause and cure of the common etc. etc. was launched on the basis of these statistics, says Aunt Polly—still without divulging any particulars.

Ever since Tony was a pup—well, then, since such endowments became deductible items, research expeditions have been setting out with more or less acclaim about the great economic advantage that will accrue from discovery of the cause and cure of the elusive "common cold."

No physician or other authority has defined "common cold" so that any other physician can understand what he's talking about. That's the way the old timers like it—indefinite.

A notable feature of nearly all the "drives," "research investigations" or organized stu-

dies undertaken to find the cause and cure of a hypothetical disease is that the newspaper publicity accorded the launching is the last we hear of the expedition.

An outstanding exception to the rule was the three year investigation recently concluded in England. From experiments on human volunteers the British investigators concluded that exposure to cold and wet had no influence on the individual's susceptibility to or immunity to respiratory infection.

So what? Who in America cares what British investigators find, and vice versa? Why spoil such a fine sport as hunting for the cause and cure of a purely hypothetical ailment?

Smut Infestation Said on Increase

Portland—(U.P.)—A 24 per cent increase in smut infestation of wheat in the Pacific Northwest has been reported by Robert E. White, a grain supervisor for the Department of Agriculture.

White said a representative sample of Northwest wheat lots showed last year 28.7 per cent of hard red winter and white wheat carried smut. The 4.8 per cent figure during 1953 was the lowest recorded in the 10 years the inspections have been conducted.

The department said smut conditions were much worse in Idaho and Washington than in Oregon last year.

The regional loss due to smut last year is estimated in excess of \$4,000,000.

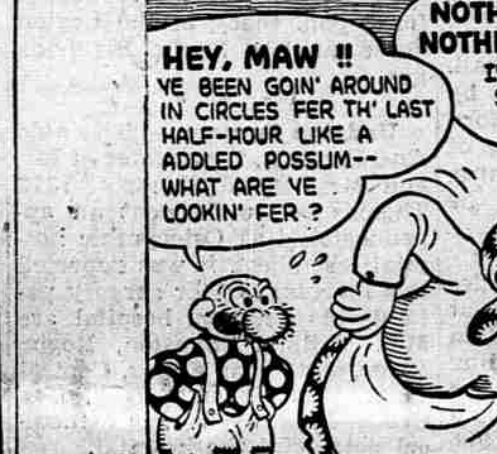
