Russia Shifts Date of Lenin Celebrations

London—(U.P.)—Radio Moscow announced today that in future Russia's annual Lenin celebrations will be held on the April 22 anniversary of the Red pioneer's birth rather than on the Jan. 21 anniversary of his death.

The broadcast quoted a Communist party decree signed by first secretary N. S. Krushchev as authority for the change.

Violent Rains Destroy Many Homes in Greece

Alexandropolis, Greece—(U.P.)—Violent rains in Macedonia and Thrace this week drowned seven persons, isolated at least 14 villages and destroyed hundreds of homes, it was announced today.

Half a dozen rivers have overflowed their banks, transforming the Rodopi plain into a lake dotted with village "islands." Army engineers are working today to restore communications cut by the floods.
