New Soldier Promotion Quarrel Seen Between McCarthy and Army

Washington — (U.P.) — A new feud developed today between Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy and the Army over the promotion of another Army man who took refuge behind the Fifth Amendment when asked if he were a Communist.

The Army announced last night it has revoked the promotion to corporal of Pfc. Marvin S. Belski and reprimanded the officer responsible for the promotion.

The announcement came after McCarthy, who inquired of the Army for nearly a year as to "Who promoted Peress?", said he had posed a new question: "Who promoted Belski?"

McCarthy feuded with the Army through most of 1954 over the promotion and honorable discharge given former Maj. Irving Peress after he refused to testify whether he was a Communist.

Belski, 26, is a physician who was caught up in the regular draft and stationed at Murphy General Hospital near Boston.

Testifying before McCarthy's investigating subcommittee last March, he took refuge in the Fifth Amendment when asked if he were a Communist.

The Army said Belski was promoted to corporal last Sept. 21 by Col. Arthur J. Redland, commanding officer at Murphy.

The Army said Redland "did not first obtain necessary approval" from proper officials and thus violated instructions.

Under the instructions, an officer must get permission from Washington before promoting a serviceman who has taken refuge in the Fifth Amendment before a congressional committee.

Belski was promoted to private first class before the regulation went into effect.

The promotion was ordered revoked, effective yesterday, and Redland was given a formal reprimand.

New Kiwanis Officers Take Severe Quake Rips City in Algeria

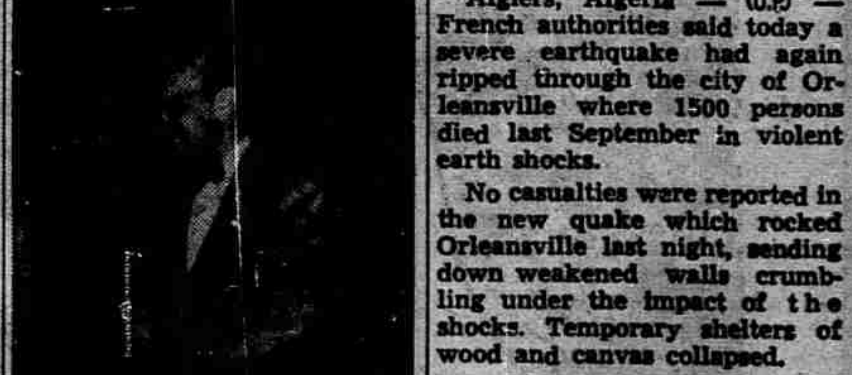
