Legislators Due Welfare Report

Sale m—(U.P.)—A proposal to spend \$800,000 in the next biennium for improved public welfare administration in Oregon was included in a report ready for submission to the legislature today by an interim committee on public welfare.

The committee, created by the 1953 Legislature to study welfare problems, recommended that the legislature appropriate \$800,000 for a hospital for crippled children and \$200,000 to hire extra legal counsel to prosecute non-support cases.

The committee was headed by former Sen. Rex Ellis of Pendleton. In line with the non-support recommendation, the committee suggested increasing the one-year jail sentence now possible for fathers who refuse to support their children to three or five years.

The hospital proposed for crippled children would be a 60-bed institution operated in connection with the University of Oregon medical school. Bills implementing the recommendations have yet to be submitted to the Legislature.

Move to Phoenix Area

Phoenix—Remodeling will be started this week on a building one mile north of here on Highway 99 for use as the new location of the Pik Pak company, according to an announcement made through officers of the firm. It is expected to be ready for occupancy by Feb. 1.

Archeologists To Explore Ancient Mayan Civilization

Mexico City — (U.P.) — That cave where the sun hides at night is going to be explored by American archeologists. Buried cities and a "lost tribe" of the ancient Mayan civilization also will be the goal of a 1955 joint American-Mexican expedition into the unmapped jungles near the Guatemalan border.

Archeologists Frederick Peterson of Sheboygan, Wis., and Juan Leonard, American-born resident of Mexico City, said their safari will obtain "all possible" scientific information of a virtually unknown area that once may have been a stronghold of the vanished Mayan Empire.

To Explore Blank Spots The expedition, one of the largest and most ambitious in many years, will hack its way through the tropical rain-forest to orchid-hung Lake Miramar in Chiapas State next February. From a supply base there, the archeologists will explore systematically the blank spots on the map between the Usumacinta and Jacate rivers.

The area is the home of the fast-disappearing Lacandon Indians, believed to be descendants of the once-mighty Mayans. Peterson said the "cave of the sun," a huge underground cavern taboo to Lacandones, will be studied thoroughly for the first time. The cave, possibly larger than the famed Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico, may contain remnants of early civilizations.

"Because it is taboo to the Indians who believe that the sun goes there to rest every night, we hope that any traces of early man will have been undisturbed through the centuries," said Peterson. The 35-year-old archeologist and his partner penetrated nearly a mile into the cave a year ago, but were forced to turn back because of lack of supplies. Leonard, 42, whose specialty is anthropology, said that this time we want to see just how big it really is, and I'm hoping we'll find evidence that man may have lived there centuries ago."

Peterson said the three known groups of Lacandon Indians are fast disappearing, and "we want to obtain all possible information from them before we lose forever their traditions." He said the expedition also
