Soviet Summon Envoy Home From France

Paris—(U.P.)—The Soviet Union called home its ambassador to France for consultations today in an increasingly tough Communist campaign to stop the rearmament of West Germany.

Russia fired notes last night to the five present Brussels treaty powers protesting that the contemplated Western European Union violated the Geneva Convention on the use of chemical and bacteriological weapons.

A brief announcement by the Soviet Embassy said Ambassador Serge Vinogradov will leave Paris for Moscow via Berlin this afternoon for consultations.

Chase, Manhattan Banks Plan Merger

New York—(U.P.)—New York's Chase National Bank and the state chartered Bank of the Manhattan Company plan to merge into what will be the nation's second largest bank.

The combined banking firm, with assets of over \$7,576,000,000 will be second only the \$8,000,000,000 Bank of America in California. The announcement yesterday said the merger all ready has been approved by directors of both firms.

The new bank will be known as the Chase Manhattan Bank.

Vest Pocket Telephone Service Will Follow Wherever You Go

New York—(U.P.)—Pretty soon they'll have it so your telephone follows wherever you go. It will ring in your pocket or purse.

While radio-telephones have been installed in automobiles, the age of vest pocket telephones still exists only in science fiction. But down at the office of Aircall, a subsidiary of Telanserphone, Inc., they're getting mighty close.

Telanserphone is a telephone answering service which has been in business in New York since 1922 and now has 10,000 subscribers here and many more in branches around the country. It provides an operator to answer your phone and take a message if you are away from home or office.

Step Farther
Aircall, which came into being in 1950, goes a step further. With Aircall a subscriber in a car or on the street pulls a tiny radio receiver from his pocket, holds it to his ear and listens to a series of code numbers being broadcast from Aircall's head-

quarters. If he hears his own code number he knows there has been a call for him at his telephone and he gets in touch with Telanserphone to get the message. That's pretty slick, but not slick enough.

"Sometimes a subscriber forgets for an hour or two to listen to our radio," said Sherman Amsden, head of Telanserphone. "And then sometimes it takes a whole minute to hear all the code numbers currently being paged. A minute can be a long time."

Sure Thing
So Aircall is coming out with in six months with the "Air-pager." This will save time for the hard-pressed subscriber and make sure he doesn't duck his phone calls.

The "Air-pager" involves a radio receiver about the size of a pack of king-size cigarettes. It fits into a pocket and stays there. When you are wanted on the phone, the receiver buzzes and you head for a phone booth.

The radio signals which will activate the vest-pocket buzzers will emanate from the tower of the Empire State Building on a radio frequency just below those used by New York television stations, which also send out their signals from the world's tallest building.

In Aircall's office a few blocks away an operator will sit before a switchboard where she can activate any buzzer in more than 4,000 vest pockets or women's purses. It will catch them wherever they are within 35 miles.

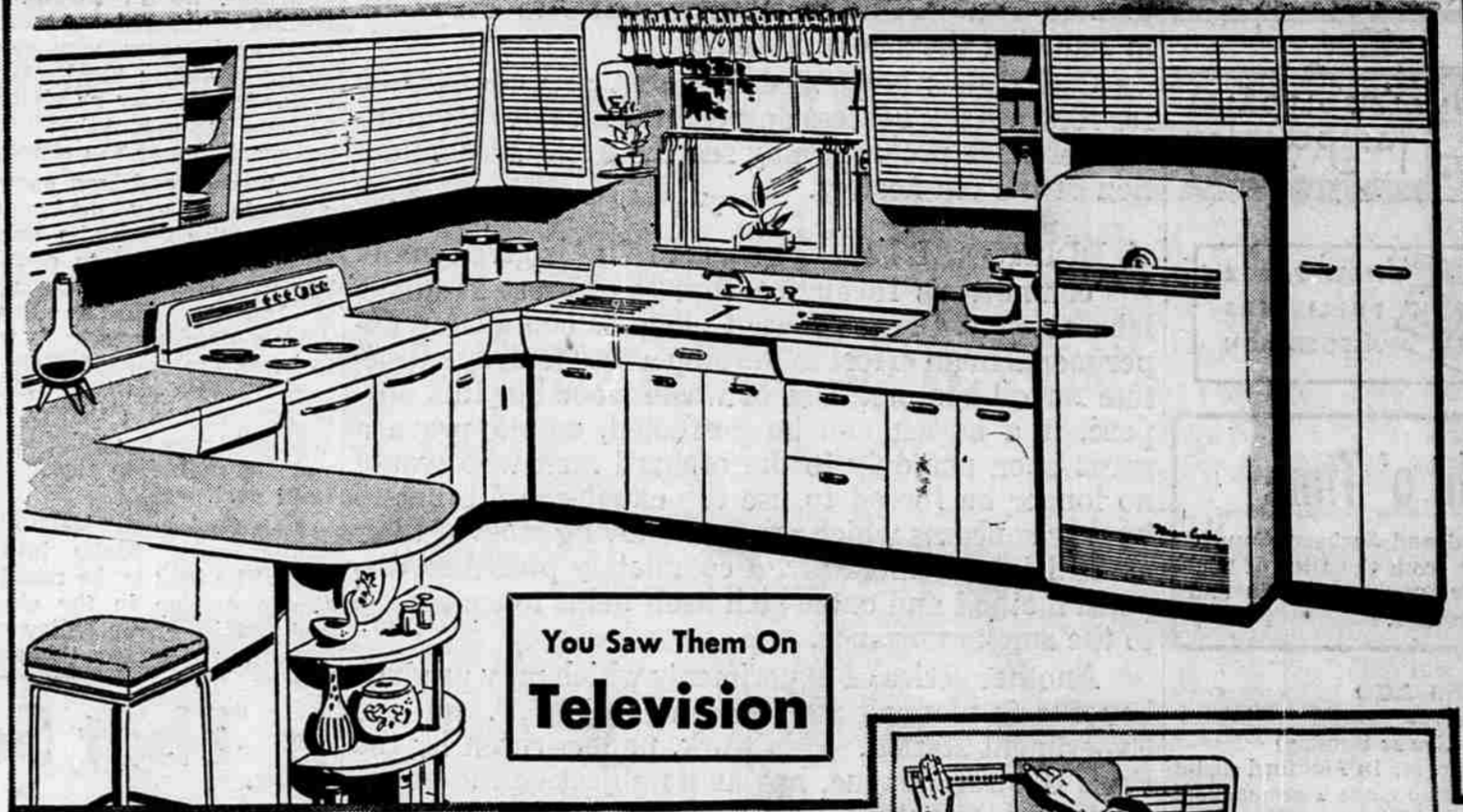

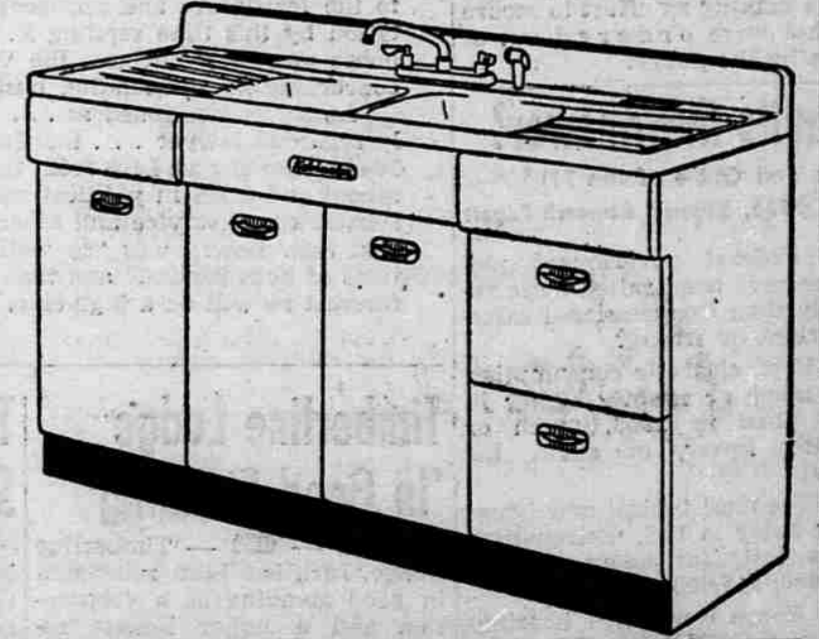

Tachen Quiet After Five Days of Bombing

Taipei, Formosa—(U.P.)—Tachen Island, a Nationalist outpost 200 miles north of Formosa, was reported quiet today after five days of heavy aerial activity but a Nationalist spokesman repeated warnings that the Communists were capable of assaulting it at any time.

Col. Lu Ta, Nationalist military spokesman, said the Reds had massed aircraft, ships and troops for an invasion and that he believed they were preparing to hit Tachen or other of the Nationalist-held islands off the mainland.
