New Cotton Textile Given Name of Azoton

Azoton, a new word coined recently by the Institute of Textile Technology at Charlottesville, Va., may become an important word for consumers.

It is the name given by institute scientists to a chemically treated cotton textile fiber currently under development. This improved fiber is produced by reaction of ordinary cotton with a chemical compound, acrylonitrile.

The process results in a cotton fiber reported to possess improved resistance to wear, heat, rot, and chemical attack. Abotons fibers also are said to have better strength, dyeing qualities, and improved electrical insula-

Roosevelt School Safety Program To Be Wednesday

Roosevelt school will present a program on "Safety" Wednesday, January 19, over Station KBES-TV from 4:30 to 5 p.m. John Childers, principal of the school, will direct the program. The program, while presented by the Roosevelt group, will point up the facts concerned with winning of the National Safety council's national school safety honor roll award by all elementary schools in Medford for four consecutive years.

Medford schools are the only elementary schools in Oregon to receive the award, and ranked fourth in the nation in their classifications. This was among 458 participating cities with a population between 10 to 20,000. These figures are contained in the "Annual Inventory of Traffic Safety Activities" published by the National Safety council.

Mr. Childers plans to bring out how each year, the schools must work harder to achieve these awards, and also some of the things that must be improved each time to win.

Mrs. Lou Cranston, president of Roosevelt PTA, and Officer Berle Stephens will appear on the program with Mr. Childers and some of the children from the higher grades in the school.
