Spring Coats Do More Than Keep Out Wind

New York—(U.P.)—Ever since man got the idea that a lady's coat should do more than just keep out the wind, there's been no stopping the search for new ways to turn a simple wool coat into a thing of beauty and a joy to the neighborhood cleaners.

If has been a see-saw battle between fur folks and cloth coat concerns to see who could come up first with the fanciest.

Now, in answer to last winter's pink mink and pale yellow fox, we have the latest spring cloth coats.

One little item which should turn those pink minks green with envy is a white wool fleece coat completely overlaid with white alencon lace and studded with rhinestones and baroque pearls.

This coat was shown Friday in one of the six fashions shows which completed the week of spring fashion previews sponsored by the couture group of the New York Dress institute.

Lace-covered fleece coats are the inspiration of the Originala company. That full-length white wool and lace and jeweled job costs \$650. You may buy a jacket version of the same thing for \$250.

Other ideas by Originala to brighten the old hall coat closet include:

An off-shoulder white fleece cape stole studded with rhinestones, pearls and gold embroidery; a cardigan coat with the neck banded by multi-colored stones to simulate an Egyptian necklace the coat fastens appropriately with a jeweler's clasp; a jewel-studded mandarin collar on a mint blue fleece and a full length coat decorated with gold beads and gold bullion leaf embroidery.

Generally, the spring coats are slimmer, by the way, in case the jewel trim doesn't outshine the shape of the whole thing.

Other surprises are in store for coat buyers too. Monte Sano and Pruzan are introducing a new cotton matelasse fabric from France in a slim, perky coat that looks like dull silk brocade. The same coat and suit company has slim coats in two lengths—knee length and skirt length—in unusual tweed fabrics.
