

Kiwanis Club Here Observes Organization's 40th Year

Fortieth anniversary of Kiwanis International was observed and past presidents of the Medford Kiwanis club were honored yesterday at the regular noon luncheon of the club.

Nine past-presidents of the Medford organization and two other members of the Medford group who served as presidents of other Kiwanis clubs were present and took part in the meeting of Rogue Valley Country club.

Heading the list was William J. Warner who served in 1923 as first Kiwanis president here. Others were Everett Faber 1935, Dr. C. H. Paske 1937, Frank Perl 1946, Paul Selby 1948, Bob Rector, 1951, Jennings Pierce 1952, E. Ron Rice 1953 and Boyd Budge 1954.

Pierce was master of ceremonies for the program. Dr. L. P. Walker, immediate past lieutenant governor of Pacific Northwest district's Division 15, discussed the 40 years of Kiwanis and its significance. Walker, member of the Medford club, is a former president of the Astoria club.

Selby and Pierce presented the "Cavalcade of Presidents." Each of the former presidents attending was permitted to wield the gavel for one minute. Whereabouts of other living ex-presidents was told and the names of deceased past presidents was read. The Rev. Ray Hurn offered a prayer in honor of those deceased. Dwight Houghton gave a talk saluting past presidents.

Others Honored
Jack Burpee, Medford club member and Bend Kiwanis president in 1948, was among those honored. Faber was recognized for his one-time service as a lieutenant-governor.

It was announced at the meeting that the annual talent party for the Kiwanis Kapers will be on Jan. 31 at the senior high school. Performers of high school age and over will be sought. The Kapers production, "Tel-Aversions," will be presented here on Feb. 23, 24, 25 and 26.

American Campus Registrations Higher

Cincinnati—(U.P.)—For the second consecutive year, this fall's registrations on American campuses set an upward trend.

Dr. Raymond Walters, University of Cincinnati president, announced the trend in his 35th annual college-university enrollment survey for School and Society, educational journal.

Covering 846 approved universities and four-year colleges—94.5 per cent of all such accredited institutions in the United States and territories, the 1954 study shows increases over last fall of 6.8 per cent in full-time students; 9.7 per cent in part-time students and 7.6 per cent in grand totals.

The reporting institutions have 1,383,750 full-time and 1,685,280 grand-total students. For the second consecutive year there is an upward trend in contrast with the preceding five years of descending enrollments following the exodus of World War II veteran-students.
