

### McCarthy, Wife Excluded From Formal Presidential Dinners at White House

Washington — (U.P.) — President and Mrs. Eisenhower apparently won't be seeing Sen. and Mrs. Joseph R. McCarthy this winter social season. Whether or not the McCartneys were excluded purposely from two formal dinners at the White House this week became a national point of interest Thursday.

### Polio Mystery Man Not Identified; Prizes, Clue Added

### Chairmen Invited

To these two dinners were invited the new Democratic chairmen of the top committees of the House and Senate, plus the ranking Republican members.

As Washington protocol goes, McCarthy should have been included in his role as ranking Republican on the Senate Government Operations committee.

Washington society reporters noted that the controversial Wisconsin senator and his wife were not on the guest list.

However, the White House took an attitude of studied amazement at the mere suggestion by reporters the McCartneys should have been invited to the two formal dinners this week, but on the point of deliberate exclusion, Hagerly said, "I don't check on Mr. and Mrs. Eisenhower's guests."

McCarthy, when a news account of the supposed snub was read to him by a reporter, laughed and said he had no comment.

The President and Mrs. Eisenhower invited the McCartneys to a White House congressional reception on Jan. 14, but the McCartneys did not attend. The guest list that night approached 2,000 persons, but only 773 people appeared. This is considerably lower than normal.

There was no indication of any particular concern at the executive mansion today over the failure of the McCartneys to join the winter festivities.

### Purged Japanese Commie Emerges

Tokyo — (U.P.) — One of Japan's top communists purged by Gen. Douglas MacArthur in 1950, came out of the underground today to lead the country's 100,000 Reds in a comeback campaign.

Yoshio Shiga, 48, former editor of the Communist newspaper "Red Flag," said the party's immediate objective will be 35 seats in the House of Representatives in the Feb. 27 elections.

Shiga said that the Japanese Communist party would run 77 candidates in the contest and campaign for resumption of relations with Russia and Red China, a ban on atom bombs, and greater trade and cultural exchange with Soviet satellite countries.

He said four of the 24 Communist Central committee members purged by MacArthur would take part in the drive.

The party's comeback plans were timed to capitalize on the unexpectedly warm response given Moscow and Peiping "peace offensive" feelers in Tokyo and build up its cumulative effect.

### Shope Offers Nautilus Submarine Sandwich

Teaneck, N. J. — (U.P.) — The New England Pizza Shoppe today featured the "Nautilus," an atomic submarine sandwich.

It consists of four kinds of Italian meat, provolone cheese, lettuce, tomato, onion, anchovy, cherry peppers, pimento, green peppers, oregano, pickles, crushed olives, salt, pepper, oil, wine vinegar, Parmesan cheese and is served on a 16-inch loaf of Italian bread. Cost? \$1.25 and serves "up to three people."

### Salk Vaccine Must Pass Federal Test

Washington — (U.P.) — The new Salk polio vaccine must pass government tests before it can be offered to the general public, a Public Health Service official said today.

The National Institute of Health, research branch of the Public Health Service, must certify that the vaccine is safe and effective before it is made available generally, Dr. David E. Price, assistant surgeon general, said in an interview.

Nearly half a million young school children were inoculated with the vaccine last year in a mass test to determine its effectiveness in preventing infantile paralysis. The outcome of that experiment will not be known until April when experts complete a complicated analysis of the 1954 polio outbreak. The study is being conducted at the University of Michigan.

Price said this report will be a major factor in determining whether the vaccine gets a government okay.

### Nautilus Submerges For Navy Cameramen

Groton, Conn. — (U.P.) — The nuclear-powered submarine Nautilus, which made its first dive yesterday, repeated the history-making performance today, this time for Navy photographers who were prevented by rough weather from filming the first event.

The Nautilus went under yesterday at 1:39 p.m., and remained submerged for one hour, according to a Navy announcement. Lt. William H. Layman, San Diego, the diving officer, took it down.

The submarine rescue vessel, Skylark, which has attended the Nautilus at all of its trial operations, circled nearby. A Navy helicopter hovered overhead.

### Bill Planned To Appoint State Attorney General

Salem — (U.P.) — Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon Republican, said today he was preparing legislation to make the office of attorney general appointive instead of elective in Oregon.

Gill said he was not aiming the bill at Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton, a Democrat. "I simply believe the governor should be permitted to hire his own lawyer," he said.
