Frank Bash Named To Represent UMC On Oregon Chest

Frank C. Bash, vice-president and treasurer of the California Oregon Power company, last week was elected to the board of directors of the Oregon Chest as Jackson county representative by the directors of the United Medford Crusade.

Bash was a former president of the Jackson County Community Chest, the Greater Medford Community Chest and chairman of the Medford Plan.

He is well qualified to serve the interests of this community in the state organization with a familiarity with the various agencies concerned and the needs of the county for health and welfare work, UMC directors said.

Agencies of the Oregon Chest, numbering 16, are represented locally by the United Medford Crusade. With the exception of the United Defense Fund and the International Social Service Bureau (which have an even larger scope), the agencies offer state wide service in their fields, and are supported by each county in relation to the services rendered and population.

Bash will attend the agency review board in the spring to investigate the budgets of these agencies and to recommend their share of the total budgets as approved. He has served in this capacity in two previous years.

Central Point Gives Building Go-Ahead

Central Point—The city council at Central Point last week ordered the Medford architectural firm of Ketter and Edson to draw up final plans for the proposed city hall-library, to be presented at the regular council meeting on Feb. 1.

In an adjourned meeting Thursday, the council revised some of the preliminary plans before final adoption. Major changes included lowering the ceiling two feet and setting the building back five feet farther towards the alley.

The council is also considering use of a common or "party" wall with the adjacent store building, owned by N. A. Mead. The council also accepted the low bid by Shell Oil company for regular and Ethyl gasoline. Bid price was 22.36 cents for regular and 24.26 cents for Ethyl. The bid was made jointly by Shell and the Ward Sherman service station, as the city has no storage facilities and must use the station's.

An accessories bid is being considered by the council.

Educational Problems Subject of Meeting

Some 40 or 50 Jackson county people interested in educational problems will attend a meeting at the Rogue Valley Country club at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 25, to hear representatives of the Oregon Education association.

The meeting, part of the "Operation Information" now being conducted by the OEA, is for the purpose of distributing information about problems faced by education today.



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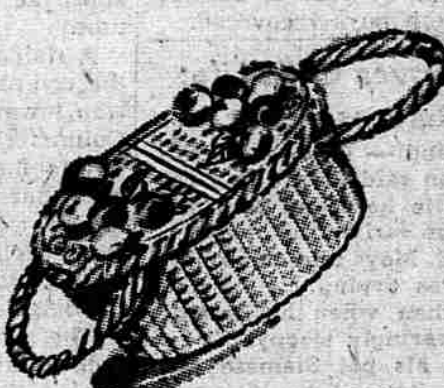


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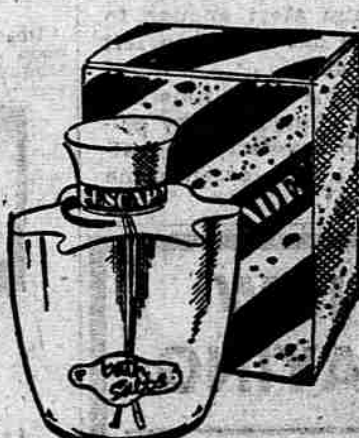
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
