Life in Germany Described for AAUW Members

Mrs. William H. Bartlett spoke at a meeting of Medford branch, American Association of University Women, Wednesday evening at the home of Mrs. A. N. Potter, Jr., 1315 Queen Anne avenue.

Mrs. Bartlett, wife of a retired army colonel, spoke on life in the French zone of Germany where they lived for two years while her husband was with the Army of Occupation. She discussed briefly the German-American club to which she belonged, the main purpose of which was to create a feeling of friendship between the Germans and Americans.

Germany is felt to be one of our strongest Allies in Europe, according to Mrs. Bartlett, and the American GI is our most important ambassador abroad. The GI's natural friendliness, especially to children, plays a most important part in strengthening friendship ties with Germany and in furthering closer relations with them.

Mrs. Bartlett displayed miniature houses and people, typical of people living in the Berchtesgarden area, the Black Forest and the Bavarian region, as well as some of the articles of clothing typical of those worn in Bavaria. She also showed colored slides taken by the Bartletts during their period of residence in Germany.

The Bartletts lived in Medford briefly for a period of three months during the war when he was stationed at Camp White and liked the Rogue Valley so well they decided to make their permanent home here upon his retirement from the service. They have recently returned to Medford and are now living in their home on Valley View drive.
