

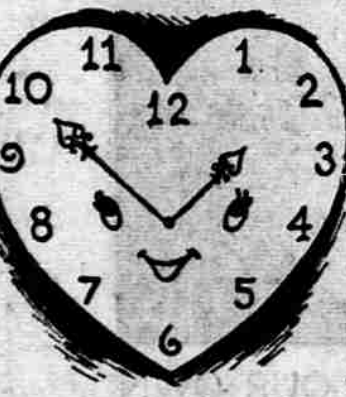
Dinner Planned By Two Groups

Wife of State Legislator Describes Official Life; Committees Begin Work

"In the souls of its citizens will be found the likeness of the State, which, if they be unjust and tyrannical, then will it reflect their vices, but if they be lovers of righteousness, confident in their liberties, so will it be clean in justice, bold in freedom." This message inscribed in the rotunda of Oregon's capitol, is the first thing one sees upon entering the State House.

The House of Representatives convened at 10:00 a. m. Monday, January 10, the first session of the forty-eighth legislative assembly. It was our first time to sit on the floor of the House—Al, a member; I as a secretary. We drew desk number eight. On our right are Representative and Mrs. Annala of Hood River. Just in front of us are Representative and Mrs. Dooley, and behind us is Representative Cone. To our left are Representative Corbett and Representative Loucks. All are Democrats, with the exception of Representative Cone and Representative Loucks. Representative Maurine Neuberger is just two desks back and to our left. The new representatives were sworn in as a group, and the roll called. It was a thrill to hear Al's name called and to have him answer, "Here."

It was a short session and we were recessed until 2 p. m. when there would be a joint session of the senate and the House of Representatives for the inauguration of Governor Patterson in the House, as the House of Representatives is much larger than the Senate.

When we returned from lunch, the Frank Bashes were already in the chairs that had been provided for them by Al's desk. They were to be our guests for the inaugural (Mrs. Bash is Republican central committeewoman in Jackson County.) It was an impressive sight to see the senior members of the House escort in Governor Patterson, the judges, state officials and members of the Senate. Mrs. Patterson and the governor's party were escorted in by ranking army officers. Mrs. Patterson wore a plum colored dress with three-quarter length sleeves, black gloves, no hat. Her hair is always just so, and she always has a nice smile on her face—always looks like she is having the time of her life. The Governor speaks well and easily, always holds his audience even
