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Many Rules Confuse Parents SOC Professor Tells Group

Because of the great amount of material being written and said about the rearing of children, parents have become confused. Dr. Phyllis Plichta of Southern Oregon college told Jackson Parent-Teacher association Friday.

Dr. Plichta went on to list what she called "Ten little bits of confusion." The first was the idea that parents are entirely responsible for the child which leads to apologizing for the child's behavior and not being able to understand why he does what he does.

Other points were that parents expect too much too soon from children, or they expect too little too late. Many parents refuse to accept each child as he

is, compare him to other youngsters of his age who can do more which in turn makes the child feel that his parents don't care for him. "If your dream of a football player in the family turns out to be a Shakespearean actor, don't make an issue of it," Miss Plichta said, adding that each should be allowed to develop individually.

Pointing out that many parents make their children self-conscious, Miss Plichta said parents should not criticize directly, but set a good example which the children will in time follow without being prompted. She said parents should not talk about a child in his presence.

The speaker said parents should not confuse discipline by being very strict about an issue one time, and treating it lightly the next. Do not give a child too many choices, Miss Plichta said, and do not let him make a choice unless prepared to follow it up.

Parents should not overdo the business of being a "pal" to a son or daughter, she said, adding that children respect parents more if they "act their age." A child should be given responsibility, the speaker said, and not be allowed to feel that his parents will always be on hand to bear the brunt of every situation.

Parents should "live with and not for" their children, the speaker declared, and added "enjoy him at every age, for he will never be that age again. Don't always wait for an age when you think he will be more fun." Dr. Plichta closed by saying parents should not try to follow too many rules and regulations, but should relax and enjoy their children and make an effort to have a happy home.

Boy Scouts Eugene Lantz and Joe LeFaire presented the colors as the meeting was opened. Mrs. Rex Nicodemus, vice-president, gave the invocation.

The fourth grade chorus sang four songs. Donald Kent announced the songs for the group. The chorus was directed by Mrs. Gloria Johnson and accompanied by Mrs. Joanne Sousa, both fourth grade teachers.

Tom Newton, physical education director for Jackson school, explained the physical education program of the school, and followed his talk-up by presenting a group of fifth and sixth grade students in a tumbling exhibition.

The proceeds of a cake sale given by the Jackson unit in November were turned over to the school to pay in part for a rheostat to be used for lighting effects during the school programs. Robert Bacus, principal, displayed the rheostat during the program and thanked the PTA for its part in the purchase.

Valentine decorations greeted the parents as they entered the cafeteria following the program. A routine business meeting was conducted by Mrs. Golden Noble president of the group, as mothers of children in the fourth grade children served refreshments.

Mrs. Gloria Johnson and Mrs. Joanne Sousa's rooms tied for the room prize for having the most parents in attendance.
