Sub-freezing weather gripped the Southland today in the wake of snow storms which made parts of Dixie look like Minnesota.

Meanwhile a surprise snow bogged down Chicago traffic and frost threatened to damage citrus crops in the semi-tropical Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Winter showed little mercy towards the Southeast, which has been getting far more than its accustomed share of snow, chilly temperatures and blustery winds.

Temperatures below the freezing mark were forecast for the area today, along with snow in the Appalachian Mountains and Arkansas.

The nippy weather even touched the plush winter playground of Miami, sending the temperature skidding from 67 to 52 in less than an hour.

## Portland School Board Opposes Pay Increase

## Electronic Brain Finds 'Lost' Planets

Cincinnati, O.—(U.P.)—Astronomers are finding more "lost" planets today because an "electronic brain" has been put to work tracking them down.

The General Electric Co., Schenectady, N.Y., has developed a giant computing device called the IBM 617 which figures out their orbits in a matter of minutes.

The Cincinnati Observatory director, Paul Herget, used it to discover the planet Athalia, lost for some 50 years.

Another expert, Herbert R. J. Grosch, spent more than 1,000 man-hours on calculations that rediscovered Jupiter's eighth satellite in 1941. Grosch said it would take him just one minute to do the job today by using the "electronic brain."
