Hollywood—(U.P.)—Hollywood faces a severe shortage of future movie stars, ex-matinee idol Conrad Nagel declared today, and he thinks it's because today's young players "take themselves too seriously."

Nagel, still suave but now a white-haired New York TV actor, has returned to the movies for the first time in seven years.

This time the stars of the Universal-International picture, "All That Heaven Allows," are Jane Wyman and Rock Hudson, and during their time before the camera Nagel sat down to reflect on what made a movie star.

At the peak of Nagel's career at MGM in the '20s and '30s he starred with such luminaries as Norma Shearer, Dolores Costello and Greta Garbo.

"And many of the stars of yesterday still are tops today—Joan Crawford, Clark Gable—because they can't bring up anybody to replace them," the veteran actor said.

"Today's younger players make the great mistake of taking themselves seriously—and their jobs not seriously enough. There is a great lack of the ingredient that made the Joan Crawfords, the Clark Gables, and that is an utter dedication to their jobs."

"The great stars of my day never took themselves seriously, but they took their work seriously, like Gable. I remember Antonio Moreno used to look at a gardener and laugh. 'There

As We Live

By ELIZABETH HURLOCK, PH.D. Child Embarrassed By Different Name

It is always embarrassing to a child to have a name that is different from his mother's. A man writes:

(Q) "Four years ago, I married a divorced woman with a daughter six years old. I was divorced too and have two children. I support them and my first wife. My present wife's first husband contributes nothing for the support of his child. For the past year my wife has been urging me to adopt her daughter legally, because she says it is embarrassing to the child to have a different name. I contend that if I do, her former husband will never do anything for the child. Then too, I feel that any money or property I may have when I die should go to my own children and that it would be unfair to them to have my second wife's daughter by another marriage inherit anything from me. Am I being selfish about this matter?"

(A) I can readily appreciate how important it is to the child to have the same surname as her mother. Each year, as she grows older it will be more and more embarrassing to her to have a different name.

However, I can also see your point of view. Naturally you feel that your first responsibility should be to your own children. So long as this child's own father is alive, he should be supporting her, even if her mother has remarried.

Before making any decision about the matter of adoption, I suggest that you consult a lawyer. Find out if some financial support cannot be obtained from the child's father.

Then ask your lawyer what can be done to assure your children of getting anything you may leave when you die, should you adopt your wife's daughter. Each state has its laws about inheritance. Unless you have a large estate, your own children may come out at the little end of the horn unless you take steps to safeguard their interests.

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Valuable Uses Found For Turkey Feathers

Gibbon, Neb.—(U.P.)—Charles Wilcox, whose turkey farm near here processes 4,500 birds a day at the height of the season, says the feathers are not wasted.

Some of the feathers are valuable. He said the best, or "pointer" feathers, from the wingtips, go into arrows. These are too valuable for machines to pluck, so they are hand-picked.

Feathers from the thighs, tail and back are shipped by the bagful to various firms for such uses as stuffing pillows.

Even the "scrap feathers" aren't wasted. They're sold for fertilizer, they contain 18 per cent sulphur, and the rest is protein.

Keeping Up With Modern Pace Advised

Philadelphia—(U.P.)—If the modern "pace" has you upset, the best thing to do is literally to keep up with it, according to Dr. Burgess L. Gordon, president of the Woman's Medical college of Pennsylvania.

"There is nothing wrong with dog-trotting when you hurry and marching when you walk," said Dr. Gordon. "When your friends say we should 'take it easy,' they are giving us the worst possible advice. If we follow their well-wishing admonition, it might do us more harm than good."

From his studies of athletes, Dr. Gordon concludes that hurrying at all times, such as dog-trotting for the train and always "marching briskly" is less harmful to health than taking it easy most of the time and then trying to rush in an emergency.

"Such emergencies are bound to come," he said. "We might as well be ready for them by keeping in training all the time."

"A habit of taking things easy physically most of the time and then placing a sudden strain on the body in an emergency is the sort of thing that costs us our lives."
