

Sanitation Problems Resulting From Inadequate Sewage Said Top Health Menace in County

Sanitation problems resulting from inadequate sewage disposal in many areas of Jackson county was discussed at a meeting of the board of directors of the Jackson County Public Health association held recently.

Dr. A. E. Merkel, county health officer, stressed the seriousness of the sanitation problem, which affects the health of every resident in the county. Mrs. Chester Guch, president of the association, pointed out that a study of health conditions in the county, made last year

by the association, showed the sewage disposal conditions to be one of the most pressing health problems facing the county.

Educational Program
It was decided by the board that the health association should do everything possible in an educational way to inform people about the matter from a health standpoint. This will be the subject of the bi-monthly meeting of the association to be held Thursday, Feb. 17, Mrs. Henry Padgham, program chairman, stated. Anyone interested is invited to this meeting, she added.

Mrs. Jack Walker, case finding chairman for the association, reported on the results of the new chest x-ray program since purchase of the x-ray machinery for the two largest county hospitals. She stated 13 people have been recalled for further study of chest conditions since opening of the out-patient clinic at Community hospital on Dec. 1.

X-Ray Machinery Arrives
Machinery for the Sacred Heart hospital arrived last week, she stated, and will be available to the public and patients as soon as installation is completed in a week or two.

Mrs. M. O. Grove, county seal sale chairman, reported that receipts are still coming in and it is felt this year's total will equal that of last year.

Mrs. Walter Bish, chairman of the mental health committee, stated that recent activities of this committee included a series of film forums and discussion groups for parents of teen-age children teachers and youth directors. She reported good participation in the forums, which are held in Rogue River, Eagle Point, Ashland and Medford.

Mrs. R. H. Denning, chairman for television programs, outlined plans for the next three months featuring health of the school age child with members of the State Board of Health and educators participating.

Dr. Lee Mellish, representing the dental society on the board, stated results of the recent dental survey made in the county will probably indicate Jackson and Josephine counties to have the highest dental decay rate in the state. He also reported on the status of the educational programs for fluoridation of municipal water supplies.

The Health association's organization of parents of mentally retarded children was asked to be represented on a state-wide planning committee, Mrs. Robert Minear, chairman, stated.

Other Reports
Other committee reports were given by Dr. Phyllis Plichta, health education chairman, Miss Helen Bullis, patient care chair-

man, Mrs. Lewis Ulrich for the Sparrow Memorial clinic, Mrs. William Knips, volunteer services, and Chandler Drew, rehabilitation.

Advisory committee members attending included Dr. Earl Lawson, Dr. Merkel, Leland Linn, Ashland, H. P. Jewett, Central Point, and Alf Mekvold, county school superintendent.

McKay Names Three To Aid Klamaths

Washington — (U.P.) — Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay today announced appointment of three Oregonians as management specialists to supervise the Klamath Indian tribal termination program.

They are Thomas B. Watters of Klamath Falls, William L. Phillips of Salem and Eugene Favall of Lakeview. They will supervise the program of property appraisal, subdivision and management under the tribal termination law approved by Congress last August.

ILWU Motion Denied By Federal Judge

Honolulu — (U.P.) — Federal Judge J. Frank McLaughlin has denied a motion by the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union to dismiss their suit with the Juneau Spruce Company of Alaska.

The ILWU filed the motion on grounds the statute of limitations had expired on the company's efforts to collect a judgment for more than one million dollars from the union.

The company was awarded a \$750,000 judgment against the ILWU. The judgment has since increased to more than one million dollars because of interest.

Patterson's Plan Included in Bill

Salem — (U.P.) — The Chief feature of Gov. Paul L. Patterson's money-raising plan as outlined in his message to the legislature was contained in a bill introduced in the house yesterday by Rep. William Bradeen of Burns.

Bradeen was joined by Sens. John Hounsell of Hood River and Eugene Allen of Portland in presenting a measure that would eliminate federal personal income taxes as an allowable deduction when paying state income tax.

Gov. Patterson estimated that repeal of the offset would increase state revenues from personal income taxes some 30 million dollars a biennium to help defray an anticipated deficit of 45 million dollars in Oregon finances for the biennium beginning next July 1.

Marilyn Silent On Reconciliation Quiz

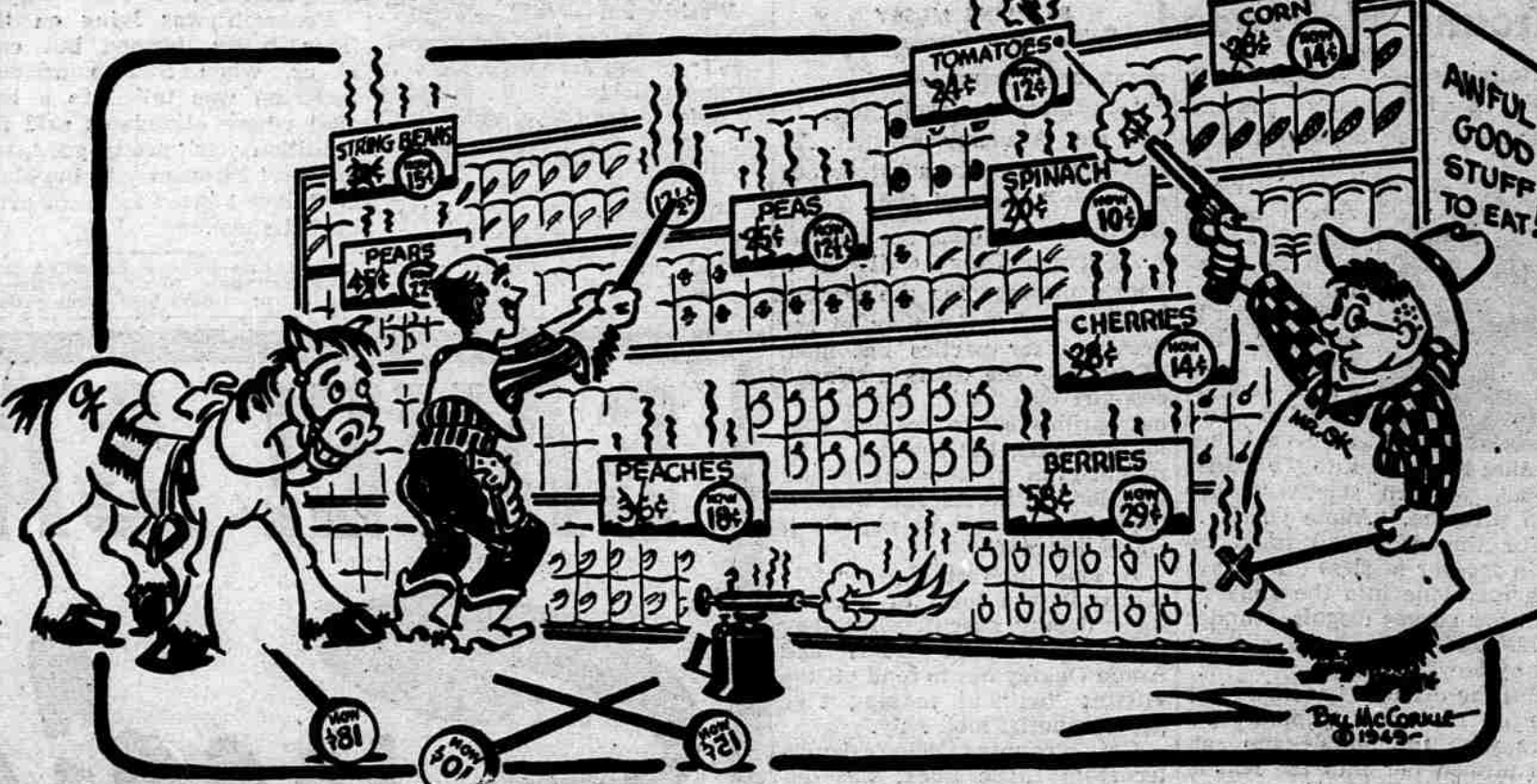
Mike Bower and Jim Swartsley were graduated into the Explorer post.
