Complete rebuilding of the projection equipment and screen of the Craterian theater is now under way, it was announced today by Robert Corbin, district manager for Robert L. Lippert Theaters, Inc.

The work will allow the theater to show moving pictures in new mediums including Cinemascope, Super Scope, and Wide Screen. The projection booth is being equipped with Stereophonic sound to allow reproduction of the new four track high fidelity sound recordings.

The new screen will entirely fill the proscenium arch of the theater, according to Corbin. He estimated that the entire project will cost several thousand dollars.
