WHO'S AN AUTHORITY ON THE C.R.I.?

The Common Cold Foundation is planning to spend half a million dollars during the next three years on research in connection with the C.R.I. It may sound like a sizable package, but really isn't when you reflect on the statistical history which shows that during the same period it will cost the national economy some where between six and 15 billion through the loss of working days due to colds.

The editorial writer remarks that previous attempts, on a smaller scale, have turned up some promising new lines and discredited some old superstitions about such infections. Promising? Uh-huh, that's what medical columnists who hold forth in the public prints say about the bewildering succession of miracle medicines that you poor souls are stuck with.

Let me tell you I call it C.R.I. (pronounced kree) for a good reason and not as a whim. If you think you know more about it than an "ordinary doctor" does, I can't tell you anything, but I can tell you to prevent most of the illness that comes to your home and thereby save not only doctor bills but—well, send me a quarter and inclose stamped, self-addressed envelope, for the booklet Call it C.R.I.

Heaven knows there are still millions and millions of unteachable in this country who attribute most of their illnesses to change of weather, drafts, wet feet, insufficient clothing, damp clothes, and the like; and a lot of charlatans who encourage the poor fees to think so, because it frees them of the responsibility of making or trying to make a diagnosis.

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there are nearly as many millions who are beginning to suspect, if they have not already learned, that indispositions or illnesses that masquerade at first as "just a bad cold" are spread via conversation, cough or sneeze spray—spread by the ignorant, the selfish, the vicious persons who continue at work, school or play when they should remain isolated from close proximity to unprotected people.

Please have the decency to call it C.R.I. You never know in the early hours, neither does a doctor if you happen to be under medical observation, how communicable your C.R.I. may be. Nor can you or the doctor tell in the early stage of the indispotion or illness whether it will prove to be grip, sinusitis, measles, tonsillitis, diphtheria, bronchitis, infantile paralysis or what not.

When you call it C.R.I. you simply say, honestly and honorably, that you suppose it is one of the Common Respiratory Infections, so you are doing what one must to prevent infecting any one else.

The editorial writer's observation that loss of working days due to colds (as he calls the C.R.I.) from 2 to 5 billion a year seems—well, it seems the kind of estimate an impersonal, irresponsible corporation would make when proposing to spend half a million on such a project.

At least a dozen such projects have been launched in the past thirty years—scientific quests for the cause and cure of "the

common cold"—an entity which no one has identified. These expeditions usually take off with considerable acclaim—in releases distributed to the press. But once they have set forth we never hear from them again.

A three or five year study of the C.R.I. was completed in England a year ago. The investigators reported to the Medical Council that ordinary "exposure" to drafts, dampness, insufficient clothing and the like had no notable influence on the susceptibility of volunteers who submitted to inoculation experiments. But we can't admit that in Yankeeland—not while we have half a million dollars to spend for research on the cause and cure of the never-never complaint.
