Committee Holds Planning Session; Film Evaluated

The mental health committee of Jackson County Public Health association held a spring planning session January 27, in the office of the county school superintendent. The group also discussed the adolescent development film series to be concluded this week, and Mrs. Walter Bish, committee president, presided.

The group planned to include in the discussions following the last film, "Meeting the Needs of Adolescents," reactions of the communities in which the films have been shown, exploration of what these films have meant to parents and educators seeing them, and to discuss community awareness of services available for help when problems of the type presented actually occur.

Also during these summing-up discussions it was planned to correlate the film series with the Saturday Evening Post reports by the United States Senate judiciary subcommittee to investigate juvenile delinquency. It is the plan of the mental health

committee to point out in the film evaluations how these current articles apply, or do not apply to the adolescent picture in Jackson county.

"Meeting the Needs of Adolescents," last film in the series of five that have been shown each week in January in Rogue River, Eagle Point, Ashland and Medford, centers on a family with a 17-year-old girl and a 14-year-old boy. It shows how their basic physical needs are met, how their mental and spiritual growth are stimulated and guided.
