Change Subject To End Off Family Arguments
Nothing makes a home more unpleasant than constant arguments. No matter what the cost, such arguments are worth avoiding. A wife writes:
(Q) "We have been married for 32 years. My husband has always been faithful and a very good worker, but he is argumentative. Even if I agree with him, he manages to find something wrong. He has a mean and unpleasant disposition. I want to be pleasant with him and keep the conversation pleasant but it is just not to be done. If he talks to me, I reply in a pleasant way. Otherwise, I have given up trying to make conversation. Any idea I have isn't any good, according to him. He enjoys making me uncomfortable and he likes to have fun at my expense. Have you any advice on how to handle him? I realize now that I should have started 32 years ago. Do you think that by my not talking to him except when he talks to me might help?"

And, if he disagrees with you, pass it off lightly by such comments as, "Perhaps you are right." Then quickly change the subject before an argument starts. It takes two to make an argument. As for his making you uncomfortable by making fun of you, ignore this too. If he sees he cannot annoy you, it will no longer be fun for him to try to hurt your feelings. 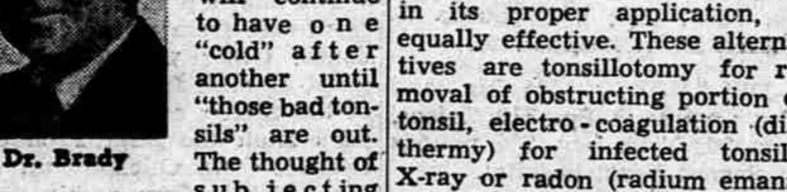

Your Health and Its Care

GIVE THE CHILDREN A BREAK
Perhaps the most frequent queries in the mail every day in the winter and spring seasons are from mothers of young children who, the doctor says, will continue to have one "cold" after another until "those bad tonsils" are out. The thought of subjecting children to a major operation which even a quack like myself considers unnecessary appalls a mother, sometimes a father, too. So, will I kindly recite once more...



No, but on written request I'll send any one who provides stamped, self-addressed envelope a pamphlet titled Tonsils Are Not All Bad, which contains the gist of my teachings about tonsillectomy. In Archives of Otolaryngology (a medical journal of ear and throat diseases) Dr. Hansel and Chang estimated that 13% of the annual total of a million and a quarter tonsillectomies are unnecessary. That would be 160,000 unwarranted tonsillectomies. To the racketeer who hates to see the truth in a newspaper, I say: Don't blast me, little man—if you think the estimate is wrong take it up with Drs. Hansel and Chang. In his book Children's Tonsils In and Out, which the everyday operators never did acclaim, Dr. Albert D. Kaiser stated that information obtained from parents of 4,400 Rochester school children from 4 to 7 years of age showed that approximately 42 per cent were subject to three or more colds a year. As Dr. Kaiser observed, these 4,400 were a selected group—for physicians had advised removal of their tonsils and adenoids for various reasons. The tonsils of 2,200 of the children were removed. The tonsils of the other 2,200 children were not removed. The health of the 4,400 children was observed for the next ten years. The frequency of colds after ten years of age declined more rapidly in the children whose tonsils had not been removed than in children of similar ages whose tonsils had been removed. It is beyond my comprehension, but at the conclusion of the chapter on the common cold Dr. Kaiser disregarded the evidence, as it seems to me, and said: "Even though the etiological factor in colds is still uncertain, there is evidence to show that unhealthy lymphoid tissue in the nasopharynx does predispose to colds and should be removed. As nearly as I can learn (and I don't spend all my time bowling on the green, darn it!) any lymphoid (adenoid, round cell, tonsil) tissue an operator removes is unhealthy. What I'd like to know is how

in the—can a doctor tell whether lymphoid tissue in the throat is "unhealthy." I repeat, it is my conviction that there are no less than three alternatives for tonsillectomy, all of which are SAFER than tonsillectomy and each of which, in its proper application, is equally effective. These alternatives are tonsillectomy for removal of obstructing portion of tonsil, electro-coagulation (diathermy) for infected tonsils, X-ray or radon (radium emanation) for shrinking adenoid masses which cause middle ear infection or impairment of hearing.

One Auto for Every 3.5 Persons in U.S.

Chicago—(U.P.)—There is one passenger car for every 3.5 persons in the United States, according to the magazine Science Digest. This adds up to more than 50,000,000 motor vehicles, of which more than 9,000,000 are trucks and buses.

Annually, the magazine said, these vehicles travel 340,000,000,000 passenger miles and carry 130,000,000,000 ton-miles of long-range freight. There are only 3,000,000,000 miles of rural roads and 319,000 miles of city streets to accommodate this huge movement of motor vehicles.

SEATTLE BOATS FINED
Callao, Peru—(U.P.)—The fishing boats Tony Bay and Western Clipper, both of Seattle, sailed from here early yesterday after each paid a \$5000 fine for violating Peru's "200 mile limit." The boats were seized 12 days ago, when they put into Callao to seek emergency aid. U. S. Ambassador Harold H.
