### Aids For Blind To Be Shown on Coming Program

The Braille tournament committee will sponsor a television program Thursday, February 3, demonstrating some of the appliances used by the blind and visually handicapped of Jackson County. The program will be on at 6:10 p.m.

George W. Rode, television publicity chairman for the tournament, is in charge of the program. He will appear with Mrs. Chris Zink, a volunteer worker with the Oregon State Commission for the Blind, Mrs. Susie McDonald and John Ragsdale, both visually handicapped.

A Braille typewriter will be demonstrated by Mrs. McDonald, and Mr. Ragsdale will tell of his experiences in running a rural paper and mail route with his wife out of Eagle Point.

A talking book machine, with records, will also be shown in an effort to demonstrate to the public the need for these appliances and the necessity of supporting the Braille tournament. The proceeds of this tournament are turned over in their entirety to the Grey Ladies of the Red Cross, who, in conjunction with Mrs. Zink, administer the blind program of Jackson County.

The proceeds of the tournament this year will be devoted to an effort to find employment channels for the physically able but visually handicapped of Jackson county.

Mr. Rode further pointed out that the people in charge of the blind program are also helping those visually handicapped to the legal extent. That is, the legal definition of blindness is 20 over 200 and those having that vision can distinguish objects, but are still considered legally blind.

The tournament will take place Saturday, February 5 at 7:30 o'clock at Camp White. Tickets may be had by calling Mrs. Al Gilhausen, 3-2825 or by contacting any number of the three sponsoring duplicate bridge clubs, Camp White Veterans' Bridge club, Medford Duplicate Bridge club and Riverside Duplicate Bridge club.

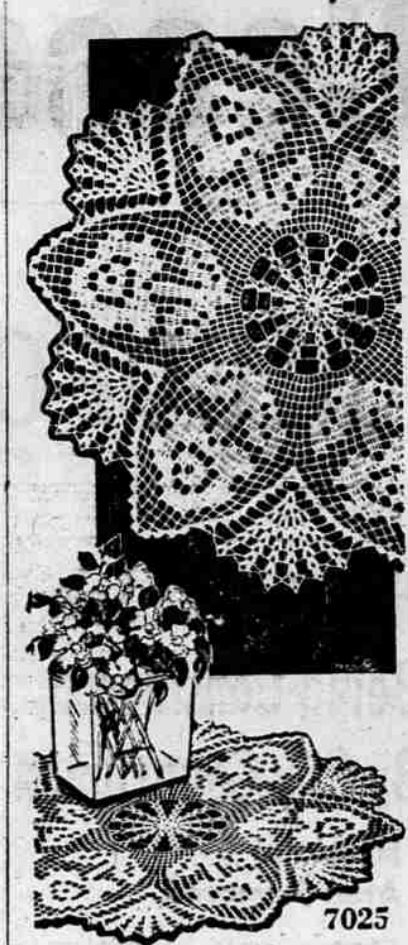

### Board To Ask Money For Capitol Mall Land

Salem—(U.P.)—The State Board of Control has voted to ask the legislature for \$200,000 to buy land in the capitol mall area.

The money would be in addition to the \$300,000 already on hand as a carry-over from past appropriations. Negotiations are now pending with the First Presbyterian church of Salem for the purchase of church property in the mall area. Board members expected that the cost of buying the church property alone may take almost half of the proposed fund.

### Margaret Rests After Flight

Port of Spain, Trinidad—(U.P.) Princess Margaret rested today after a 7,000-mile trans-Atlantic flight, but it is believed she may find time to go for a swim at the U. S. Naval Base at Macqueripe.

The first official engagement scheduled for Queen Elizabeth's 24-year-old sister is a garden party at Government House at 4:15 p.m. (EST).

The Princess arrived here Tuesday to begin a four-week tour of the Caribbean which already is being hailed as the most successful "personal appearance" in the history of the British West Indies.

Calypso singers, gasoline-drum "bands" and colorfully-costumed natives lined the roads for more than 17 miles Tuesday to cheer Margaret as she rode from Piarc Airport to Port of Spain.

Along the way, someone started singing "Look, Mama! A Queen Passing!" to the tune of a calypso called "Look, Mama! A Band Passing!" and from there on in the Princess had a "musical ride."

### Bob Hope To Quit Video Temporarily

Hollywood—(U.P.)—Comedian Bob Hope announced last night he was retiring from television temporarily to devote more time to his family and to motion pictures.

Hope said he will bow out of TV May 24 when he completes his current television series with the National Broadcasting Co., for General Foods.

After that, he intends to make only independent pictures for his own company, Hope Enterprises, with a possible occasional guest appearance on other television programs.
