Top Clubs Record Impressive Wins

Utah, La Salle, and Duquesne—three teams in position to challenge for the nation's highest ranking in the wake of Kentucky's recent defeat—put in their bids today with impressive victories.

Utah romped to its eighth straight victory, 77-38, over Los Angeles State; La Salle followed a 34-point display by All-American Tom Gola to an 85-58 conquest of Georgetown D.C.; and Duquesne easily downed Westminster, 70-56, in leading games Wednesday night.

These three teams currently are ranked 3-4-5 in the nation by the United Press Board of Coaches, behind only Kentucky and San Francisco and with a good chance to move up since Kentucky was beaten by Georgia Tech again last Monday.

A major upset saw St. Louis handed its first loss of the season in the Missouri Valley Conference by Oklahoma A and M, 67-54. The Billikens, ranked 19th nationally, thus failed to close ground on league-leading Tulsa. Texas Christian retained undisputed hold of first place in the Southwest Conference by beating Texas A and M, 92-62, at Fort Worth.

One-Armed Cage Star Now At CI

Caldwell, Ida.—(U.P.)—College of Idaho's basketball squad, currently leading the Northwest Conference, yesterday was strengthened by the addition of Cary Mays, one-armed Washington, D. C., prep sensation.

Mays, who is also reported to be an excellent baseball prospect as a catcher, scored about 500 points in his last full basketball season in high school. He graduated from Armstrong Tech last week.

Coach Sam Vokes said the 5-11 player would travel to Walla Walla with the squad Friday for a conference game against Whitman College, but he said Mays might have difficulty breaking into the C of I lineup.

The Harlem Globetrotters are reported to be interested in the handicapped athlete, according to Vokes. Mays lost his left arm in a boyhood accident.

OSC's Bill Toole Injures Ankle

Corvallis—(U.P.)—Oregon State's basketball team left here by plane for Moscow, Ida., today with Guard Bill Toole, who came to life against Washington last week, a doubtful starter against Idaho because of an ankle injury.

Toole had cracked the starting lineup but suffered a sprained ankle in practice and Trainer Bill Robertson said he hadn't decided if he would allow the Klamath Falls speedster to see action against the Vandals.

Yugoslavia Army Whipped Into Shape by Military Aid

Belgrade—(U.P.)—The man who bosses America's multi-million-dollar military aid to this Communist country thinks "we have accomplished a great deal" in helping whip its armed forces into modern shape.

He admires the Yugoslav soldier as "a fighting man" but sometimes finds sensitive military officials a bit trying to deal with.

A year ago this month Brig. Gen. Peter C. Hains took over as chief of the 7-man military assistance staff here. He had just put in a long stint as deputy director of the defense department's office of military assistance in Washington.

In an exclusive interview, the brisk, cheery, gray-haired general gave United Press some of the fruits of this year's close observation of military human nature in Yugoslavia.

He has found, he said, that the military aid job in this country is not what some might think, just a straightforward dealing with facts and figures, but rather one in which you have to take into account all sorts of psychological elements for which the businesslike western military man may not always be prepared.

Hains said he found the Yugoslav people in general friendly and hospitable, "in many ways with responses just like those of Americans," but that when it comes to talking business with them a different element creeps in.

Most military officials, he said, "are extremely proud, sensitive, and often apt to find hidden meanings in the most innocent sentence, or to take a joking remark far too seriously."

Despite occasional obstacles arising from such misunderstandings, or from "characteristics which might come from their Communist training or from some other source—one can never be quite sure which," Hains said that "in helping to develop their armed services, I think there is no question but that we have accomplished a great deal, particularly in the air service, which has developed very rapidly and effectively."

It was some 20 months ago that Yugoslavia began receiving its first jet planes, but today precision formations of Thunderjets are a familiar part of the scenery.

He praised the spirit of the Yugoslav soldier, who, he said, "is generally conceded to be a good fighter, who will fight

Alaska Will Be Scene of Greater Scientific Activity

Fairbanks—(U.P.)—All of Alaska will be the scene of increased scientific activity during the next "geophysical year," 1935-36, according to Dr. C. T. Elvey, director of the University of Alaska Geophysical Institute.

Back in 1882-83, scientists started the first "polar year." As part of the program an expedition was sent to Point Barrow. It was decided to have a polar year every 50 years.

The second such study was in 1932-33 at which time Fairbanks became a major center for the work. Due to rapid ad-

vances made in science, it was decided to step up the interval 25 years, widen the studies to embrace many fields of science and rename the period "geophysical year."

Dr. Sydney Chapman, visiting professor of geophysics at the University of Alaska, advisory scientific director for the institute, is president of the special committee for the next geophysical year. The committee is composed of representatives of 35 nations, including the USSR.

Hundred Million Needed

The plan is to coordinate all programs and areas. There will be more than a dozen stations in Alaska, including the university and two nearby stations; Big Delta, McKinley Park, Barrow, off the Arctic coast near the Canadian border; Ft. Yukon, Northway, Sheep Mountain, Anchorage, Bristol Bay, Kodiak, Adak, Nome, Sitka and possibly Mt. Wrangell. In each case use will be made of the existing facilities.

The world-wide project will cost around \$100,000,000, with the United States being asked to put up \$32,000,000.

Some of the topics for study will include the use of radar for the aurora, magnetic storms, a meteorological study of the general circulations of the atmosphere which will involve a station near the North Pole, radio wave propagation, cosmic rays and the relation of solar activity to the earth's phenomena among others.
