

Democrats Demand Probe of Budget Bureau's Part in Dixon-Yates Contract

Intervention in Atomic Energy Activity Charged

Washington — (U.P.) — Democratic congressmen today demanded an investigation of the Budget Bureau's part in the controversial Dixon-Yates power contract.

Last year's Democratic members of the House-Senate Atomic Energy Committee charged that the Budget Bureau "overstepped its legitimate authority . . . and improperly intervened in the activities of the Atomic Energy Commission."

The charges and demand for an investigation highlighted a minority report opposing the Republican majority's action in speeding action on the contract by waiving a 30-day waiting period.

Democratic members of the joint committee, now in majority control, recently pushed through a motion to rescind the waiver and to ask that the administration cancel the Dixon-Yates arrangement.

But President Eisenhower yesterday refused to withdraw the contract, which calls for construction of a steam generating power plant at West Memphis, Ark. The plant would be built by private utilities and supply power to the Tennessee Valley Authority to replace power supplied to the AEC.

In the report stemming from last year's waiver action by the Republicans, the dissenting Democrats said a majority of Atomic Energy Commission members "wishes to disassociate the commission from the Dixon-Yates negotiations as soon as it became clear that this matter was in no way related to the AEC."

Republicans disagree. "But by instruction—indeed, order—of the Bureau of the Budget, the commission was required to proceed with negotiation of a contract based upon the Dixon-Yates proposal," the Democrats charged.

The Democrats recommended that Congress investigate the Budget Bureau for this action. Republicans, defending the waiver, said the "real issue" is whether TVA is to be permitted to expand "to provide its service area in perpetuity with all power it can accept generated by any means whatsoever, and subsidized by federal funds."

Adoption of such a policy "would be rank, unrestrained, unadulterated socialism," the Republican majority report said.

2,000 Illinois Men Battle Winter Storms

Springfield, Ill. — (U.P.) — The work of keeping 14,000 miles of Illinois roads open to traffic during the winter is no small chore.

The state highway division mobilized 2,000 maintenance men and a fleet of 1,850 mechanized vehicles to do battle with winter.

Workers installed 300 miles of snow fence and stockpiled 300,000 cubic yards of sand and cinders, 1,000 tons of calcium chloride and 10,000 tons of salt at strategic spots.

The highway division estimates it spends more than \$1,500,000 a year to keep roads passable during the winter.

"DEW in Washington jargon means "Distant Early Warning,"

To the military men, all rockets are "birds." Their bases, naturally, are "nests." Thus we have guided missiles labeled "Falcons" and "Sparrows."

"Rascal" is not a juvenile delinquent. Rascal is an air to surface rocket launched from a plane to blast ground installations.

"Texas Towers" don't come from Texas. But they are towering — special radar equipment being set up on small islands and shoals off the coast to extend the warning system.

"Doppler" isn't baby talk. It's the nickname of one of our most secret devices, a radar apparatus which can talk. Or, at least, Doppler can give off sound warnings as well as the visual warnings created by conventional radar.

You won't find "Snark" in any schoolroom dictionary. Snark is a rocket with a 5000 mile range and a speed of more than 600 mph.

"Tarzon" isn't a misspelling of the jungle man. Tarzon is a controlled aerial bomb.

And the "Old Lady of X-10" is no lady. She's an atomic reactor at Oak Ridge, one of the oldest still in use.

130,000 Persons Given Free Food in Kentucky

Frankfort, Ky. — (U.P.) — A recent survey showed that more than 130,000 persons in 27 Kentucky counties were receiving free food under a joint federal-state relief program.

Most of the needy persons were located in eastern Kentucky, where there is widespread unemployment because of a slump in the coal mining industry.

The food—surplus commodities distributed by the federal department of agriculture—includes butter, cheese, non-fat dry milk, shortening, canned beef and gravy and dried beans.

Americans Said Greatest Travelers

Washington — (U.P.) — Americans are the world's greatest travelers.

To prove it, 75,000,000 of them will pack up and take "See America" vacation trips this year, according to the automobile association.

Another half million U.S. pleasure-seekers will go abroad, setting an all-time high in international travel, the AAA added.

Over 63,000,000 will travel to vacation spots by automobile, according to the AAA. Americans are showing a preference for short instead of long motor trips.

These motorists will find good news as far as prices and accommodations are concerned. There are more overnight accommodations than ever before. Many hotels are remodeling to meet the growing competition from motels.

The AAA said there will be no increase in prices over last year, a dip in prices in some places.

In the field of foreign travel, more middle and lower income families will go abroad on a "pay later" travel plan offered by many airlines and steamship companies.

Reflecting the international interest in skiing, some airlines are offering low-cost ski tours to European sports centers this winter. Pan American Airways offers such tours on its 10 per cent down, "pay later" plan.

Europe remains the most popular foreign vacation attraction for Americans, but there is increasing competition from the British West Indies, Cuba and Asia.

While Americans are viewing foreign countries, the United States will be viewed by over 600,000 foreign visitors this year, the AAA estimated.
