Widower Keeps Mementos

Of His Heartbreaker Days

Memories associated with pleasant experiences are not easily forgotten. Reminders of happy events in the past keep these memories alive. A widow writes:

(Q) "I am a widow of 50. I have been doing housework for a widower for the past eight years. A few months ago, he asked me to marry him. He still has his old love letters and pictures of himself and his old girls hung up around the house, and he also likes those pictures of scantily-dressed girls. I told him if I married him I wouldn't want those things around. He says I'm old-fashioned and jealous, and that they don't mean a thing to him. He claims his first wife never said anything about them. What do you think?"

(A) I think the only problem connected with this widower's keeping the keepsakes of his youth is whether you make it a problem or not. You cannot expect this man to give up memories of his youth when, as he now believes, he was a Romeo with whom girls fell in love at the drop of a hat.

To bolster these memories, he keeps his old love letters and pictures of himself with the different girls who were in love with him. This helps him relive the days when he felt he was a heartbreaker.

His liking for pictures of scantily-dressed girls likewise helps him to relive the past, when he felt he was sexually attractive to women. It is a form of compensation for his waning sexual

If they were letters from and pictures of one girl, or his former wife, that would be a different story. Your Health and Its Care

HEALTHY CHILDREN HAVE LARGE TONSILS

A reader sent me a clipping of what the reader said is from the editorial column of an unidentified newspaper. The item stated that an unidentified physician who is interested in medical and health questions "blasts" Dr. William Brady's teachings about rabies, tonsillitis, tonsillectomy and hernia, and says Brady is a menace, etc., etc.

Presumably the doctor who "blasts" me from his place of concealment expects that by the sheer weight of his authoritative position in the dinky town where the paper is published his dicta will prevail and my "unaccepted" views and teachings will no longer endanger the public.

To be sure, my column may disappear from the unidentified community, but will that make any difference to people in a hundred other communities who will continue to be menaced by O'Doc Brady and his dangerous teachings?

Take tonsillectomy, for instance. Here is what the chief of the pediatrics department of the University of Miami's School of Medicine said about it, at the recent clinical meeting of the A.M.A. in Miami:

"A conscientious physician recognizes the need for an occasional tonsillectomy, but all too often it is done for no particular reason."

The pediatrician said the size of the tonsils means next to nothing because they are normally enlarged in children between five and eight years of age.

In this contumacious column I have cited the observation made by Dr. Barron of Addison (not to be confused with Mr. Roth's Addison Sims of Seattle). In the routine examination of school children in the winter term Dr. Barron and other school physicians found most of the children had enlarged tonsils and sent notes to their parents suggesting that the tonsils be removed. Few if any of the parents followed the suggestion. Again after school reopened in the autumn the same doctors re-examined the children—and were astonished, Dr. Barron re-

ported, to find that the enlarged tonsils had shrunk to what the doctors considered normal.

If I kept Dr. Barron's original report (published, I believe, in the N.Y. State Jour. of Medicine years ago) it is buried somewhere in my maddening files. So I can't say positively whether Dr. Wm. E. Barron of Addison, N.Y., or Dr. Wm. (Nought) Brady pointed the moral: Decide after summer vacation is over whether to expose the child to the grave risk of tonsillectomy.

An editorial article in the Jour. A.M.A. March 16, '40, cited the statement of Drs. F. K. Hansel and C. S. Chang, in ARCH. OTOLARYNGOLOGY, for January, '40, that 13 per cent of the annual total of more than 1,250,000 tonsillectomies are UNNECESSARY—that is, no less than 160,000 persons subjected to this major operation in the course of the year have only allergy.

I hope you—you credulous parents will understand that these are not just my pipe dreams as some would have you believe, but the conclusions reached by medical authorities that can't be brushed off by the everyday operators.

Leather Gloves Aid Grip on Steering Wheel

Cincinnati, O.—(U.P.)—Leather gloves give a better grip on your car's steering wheel during winter driving, according to University of Cincinnati researchers.

They studied highway accidents caused by the driver's inability to control the wheel when going through ice and slush. They rigged up a steering wheel in a lab and ran tests over a nine-month period on gloves made of wool, nylon, rayon and other materials.

They found that when the steering wheel started to twist leather gloves provided three times the gripping ability of other materials.

Hawaiian Economy Said Needing Service

Washington—(U.P.)—Hawaiian Steamship Company, Ltd., which proposes to initiate cargo express and cabin class passenger service between San Francisco and Honolulu, told the Maritime Administration yesterday that Hawaii's "dynamic and expanding local economy" demands new service.

Hawaii was replying to Mat-

son Navigation Company objections, asserting that the territory is served adequately cargo-wise by existing carriers.

"To deny cargo privileges," the company said in a formal brief filed with the federal agency, "would be a grievous blow at the operation itself and . . . a wasteful squandering of

shipping resources vital to the Hawaiian Islands as well."
