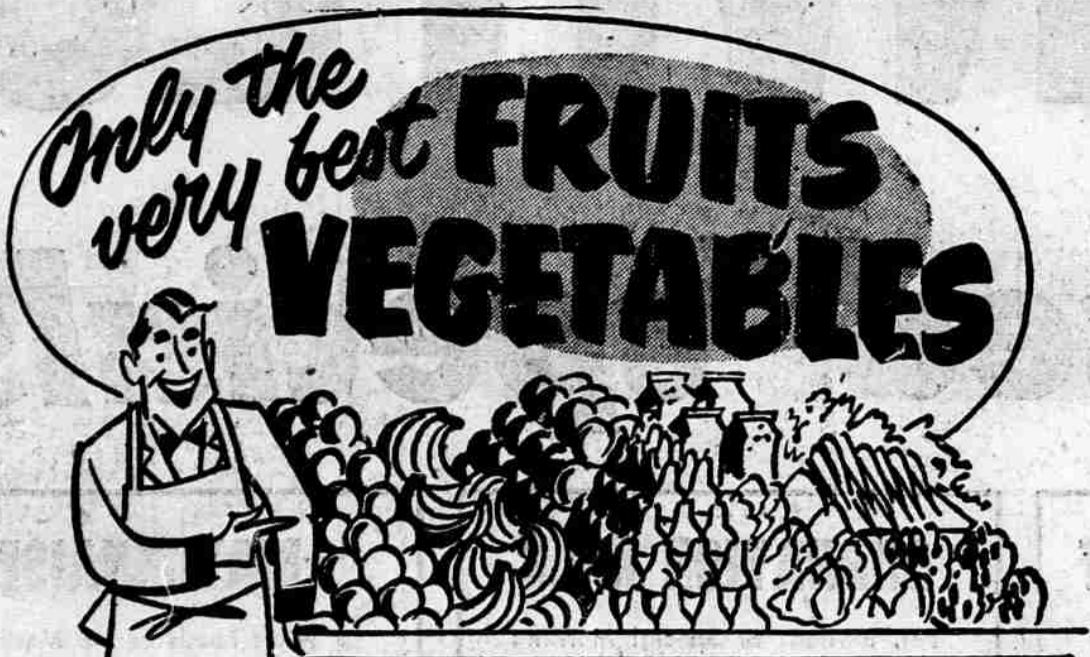

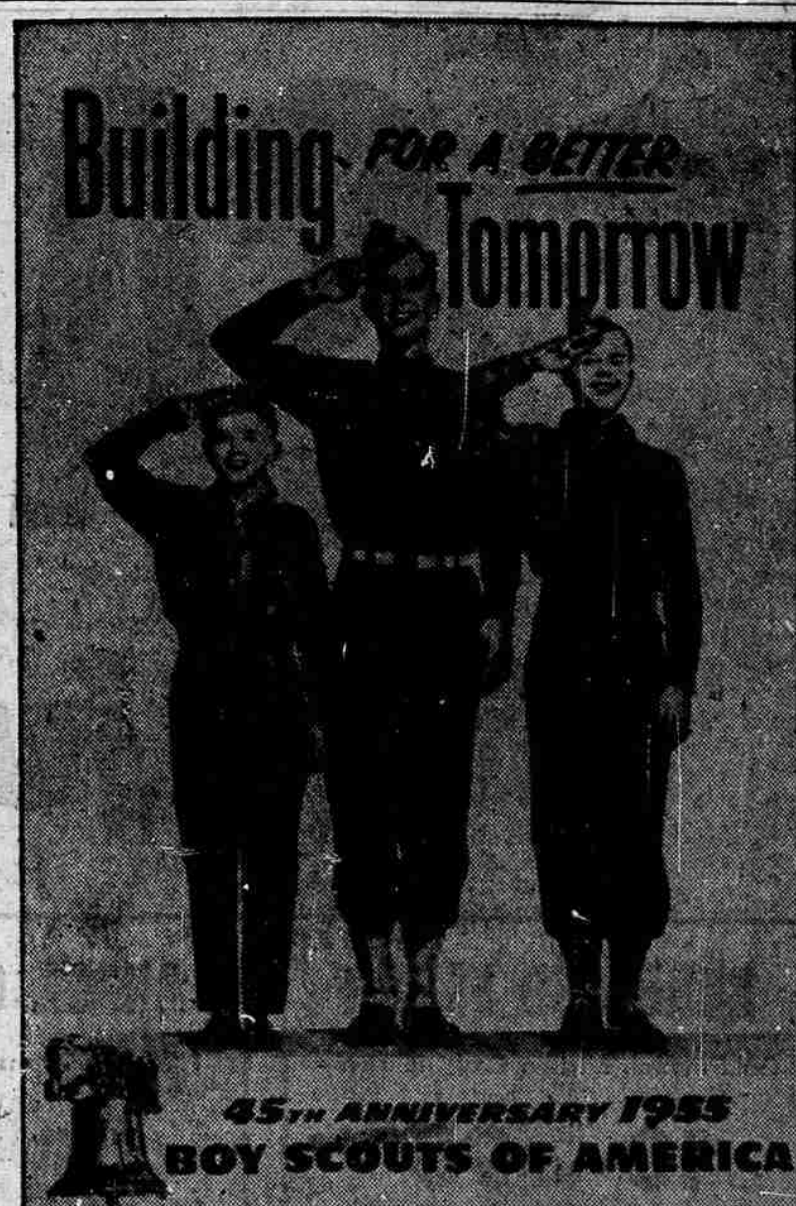

Daniels, 40-year-old merchandising manager for Fatham-Laird Advertising Agency, is listed officially as president. But his membership card shows him as "an apprentice work barge watcher."

"Work barges are much more fun to watch than land equipment," he said. "Ever see one of those barge-borne pile-drivers at work? Hat darn!"

The Society of Sidewalk Superintendents, he said, was organized "mostly for fun" but it also wants to "foster the practice of daily relaxation among all Americans."

"We think everyone should pause for a few minutes every day during their lunch hour—or even in the midst of their work routine—to make sure that any construction job in sight is being carried out properly," he said.
