Ashland—Dr. Gerald Wendt, called "the world's foremost interpreter of science to the public," will be the next speaker for Siskiyou Knife and Fork club. The meeting will be held Thursday, February 10, at the Elks club in Ashland.

Dr. Wendt will speak on "What to Expect from Science."

A former science editor for Time magazine, dean at Penn State, college professor at the University of Chicago, and director of Science and Education at the New York world's fair, Dr. Wendt has more recently written articles used by over 5,000 newspapers, the world over. His latest book, "Atomic Energy and the Hydrogen Bomb," has been translated into French, Spanish, and Japanese.

Dr. Wendt's stock in trade is the latest development in the world of science, translated into the layman's language and interpreted as to their effects on everyday living.

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
