Youth, 19, Jailed On Larceny Charge; One Man Fined \$50

Donald Glein Burgess, 19, of 809 East Ninth st., was arraigned in district court yesterday on a charge of larceny from a motor vehicle. He waived preliminary hearing and his case was bound over to the grand jury.

Bail was set \$1,000 property bond or \$400 cash and a jail commitment was issued. The district attorney's office said that the case involved thefts from cars at Rogue Valley Country club on Jan. 12.

Charges against one man were reduced and the case against another was dismissed in district court on Friday.

Pleads Guilty
Gale Junior Jones, 19, of 10th and Maple sts., Central Point, who had been charged with malicious destruction of property, pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct. He was fined \$50 plus \$5 court costs. Thirty dollars of the fine was suspended on condition the restitution be made for damages. The case concerned the breaking of a window pane in a truck owned by R. M. Little, 1900 Kings highway.

A charge of assault and battery against William Clarence Jones, 27, route 2, box 267, Grants Pass, brought by Roy Wohlford, 1900 Kings highway, was dismissed because of insufficient evidence, according to the district court report.

Qualified Ex-Air Force Men Sought for Posts

Two qualified ex-Air Force men are being sought for office work with the Medford Air Reserve center, 33 North Riverside ave., according to Capt. Donald Hemingway Jr., liaison officer.

Applicants must be eligible to re-enlist at staff sergeant or higher grade, have a minimum of five years active service, have a character and efficiency rating of at least excellent, must have returned from overseas less than 18 months ago, and must possess the specialty codes of 70250, 70270 or 73270.

The work with the AF reserve would permit an additional living allowance, the officer added. Those who do not have all the specified qualifications will not be considered for the positions.

County Dog Licenses Due, Owners Told

Dee Jones, county dog control officer, reminded dog owners of the county that licenses for their dogs are now due. Until March 1 the fee will be \$1.50, but after that date it will rise to \$3.50.

All dogs aged 8 months or more must have licenses, he said.

Licenses are available at the county court house in Medford; at the city police station in Ashland; at Rogue River Feed and Farm Supply in Rogue River, and at the Kizzie Edmonson residence in Butte Falls.

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Bills in Oregon Legislature

Salem — (U.P.)—A bill read for the first time in the House Friday would permit civil suits or actions by or against labor unions and other organizations and provides for service of processes. Sponsor of the measure was Rep. Wayne Giesy (R-Monroe).

A companion measure, also introduced by Giesy, would give union members the right to have any action of his union reviewed by a court of competent jurisdiction and would make it a misdemeanor for the union to penalize or discipline a member for exercising that right.

Other bills would provide for proof of age cards to be issued by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission; for a maximum speed law on Oregon highways; for a \$260,000 program of special education for mentally retarded and educationally advanced children; and for a limit of one on the number of campaign committees a political candidate may have.

Salem — (U.P.)—A bill to legalize marriage between white and non-white persons has been prepared for introduction into the state legislature by Rep. Maurine Neuberger.

A 1951 law made issues of such marriages legitimate, but some lawyers still questioned the legality of such a marriage.

Rep. Neuberger said she hoped the matter would be permanently cleared up by the current legislature.

Salem — (U.P.)—The right of county clerks to issue fishing and hunting licenses would be removed under a bill passed by the state Senate and sent to the House.

The Senate also passed bills to allow ice fishing and the use of nets or seines to catch non-food fish.

Salem — (U.P.)—Democrats in the Legislature introduced in the House a bill that, if passed, would put a 30 per cent surtax on present state income taxes.

The proposal was a key part of the Democratic tax program designed to raise Oregon's income without resorting to a sales tax. They would make the tax boost effective on income earned from Jan. 1 of this year.

group of senators and representatives has introduced a resolution in the House providing for the appointment of an interim committee to study employment problems in penal institutions. It would appropriate \$5000 for the job.

Salem — (U.P.)—From now on it will be Veterans' day instead of Armistice day each Nov. 11 in Oregon.

Gov. Paul L. Patterson has signed into law House bill 61, passed by the Legislature. Armistice day was called at the end

of World War I. Since then there have been World War II and the Korean action. Congress recently changed the name of Armistice day to Veterans' day, and the bill signed by Gov. Patterson brings Oregon into conformity.
