Sugar Declared Arch Enemy Of Children's Dental Health

(Editor's note: This is the second in a series of six articles dealing with dental health. They are being published in cooperation with the Southern Oregon Dental Society in observance of National Children's Dental Health week, to be observed Feb. 7 to 13. The articles were prepared under the supervision of the American Dental Association.)

Sugar is the arch enemy of your child's teeth. It has been established beyond doubt that sugar-rich foods and beverages are the greatest enemy of dental health.

One dental scientist, deploring America's gigantic sweet tooth, said we are each eating about 100 pounds of sugar a year—nearly three times as much as we need for good nutrition.

Throughout the world, the relationship between sugar consumption and tooth decay can easily be shown.

"It is well known that the amount of caries (tooth decay) any population experiences is roughly proportional to its sugar consumption," says the dental scientist.

Eskimos As Example

As one example, a study of Eskimos shows that before contact with our civilization, their teeth were practically free from dental decay. When they began to eat sugar and other carbohydrates—foods that had been strangers to them—tooth decay for the first time became a real problem.

Because dental decay is chiefly a disease of childhood and the teens, the problem of too much sweets becomes particularly important for our children.

Dentists agree that it is the between-meal snack that is the worst offender. A child who nibbles on candy, cookies or other sweets several times a day invites dental decay because each snack generates the production of new enamel-destroying acid. Sugar Common

Foods commonly eaten by youngsters between meals often contain large amounts of sugar. It has been estimated, for example, that there are seven teaspoonfuls of sugar in a nickel candy bar; four to five teaspoonfuls in a bottle of sugar-sweetened soft drinks; 14 teaspoonfuls in a piece of cherry pie.

Parents are urged to substi-

tute such other between-meal snacks as nuts, popcorn, potato chips, cheese or fresh fruits because they appease the appetite without leading to the harmful decay-producing acids.

Both the dental and medical professions have strongly recommended that school premises not be used for the sale of confections and sweetened beverages.

Detriments Outlined
They point out that excess sugar in the diet not only is detrimental to dental health but is detrimental to the general health of children as well.

First, because it appeases the appetite while adding little to nutrition.

Second, because it spoils the appetite for more nutritious foods.

Third, because it is stored up in the body in the form of fat. (Tomorrow: The Toothbrush)

New Bridge Across Columbia Requested

Olympia — (U.P.)—The State Toll Bridge Authority has under consideration a request by Klickitat county to study the feasibility of a proposed Maryhill bridge crossing the Columbia river.

The request, made at a meeting of the TBA, asked the state to share in the cost of the study. TBA Secretary Darrell Hedges said a reply had been sent to the county advising it to make a similar request to the Oregon Highway Commission.

Hedges said the TBA had indicated it would approve the study if the Oregon Highway Commission also agreed to it. Klickitat county, Wash., and Sherman county, Ore., have approved the project.

Leading Livestock Man Dies in California

Marysville, Calif. — (U.P.) — Chandler B. Church, one of the leading livestock men in Nevada and Northern California, died of an apparent heart attack here Friday. He was 51.

The Elko, Nev., rancher was president of the Nevada Wool Growers Association and former president of the Nevada Grazing Board and the California Wool Growers Association.

He was honored by being named as one of seven American shepherds to tour Australia and New Zealand as guests of wool growers in those countries.

Church was survived by his wife, Genevieve, and a daughter, Mrs. Robert Mann of Elko.
