Romack at Palm Beach

Palm Beach, Fla. — (U.P.) — Favored Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif., headed a field of approximately 100 women golfers who teed off today in the qualifying round of the 37th annual Palm Beach tournament.

Miss Romack, who is the women's national champion, is still seeking her first victory on the Florida winter tour.

Among those who are expected to furnish her greatest opposition are defending champion Joyce Ziské of Waterford, Wis., who combined with Wiffi Smith of Los Angeles to win the Hollywood Four-Ball tournament; Ronnie Colby of Hollywood, Fla.; Pat Lesser of Seattle, who defeated Miss Romack in the final round of the Miami Doherty tournament, and veteran Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex.

The field will be reduced to a championship flight of 32 with two-some match eliminations scheduled to begin Wednesday.

County's Disease Total Increases

The total number of communicable disease cases in Jackson county climbed again last week, according to the county health department. There were 61 cases listed.

Leading the list were 31 cases of chicken pox, with the largest number, 14, reported from Phoenix. Eight others were reported from Talent; four from Central Point, three from Medford, and one each from Ashland and Jacksonville.

Nine cases of pneumonia were listed, five in Medford, two in Ashland, and one each in Jacksonville and Phoenix. Other disease cases listed included three of influenza, five of scarlet fever, six of measles, two of strep throat, and single cases of scalp ringworm, infectious hepatitis, amoebic dysentery, infectious mononucleosis and whooping cough.

Freak Gunshot Fatal To Corvallis Child

Corvallis — (U.P.) — A two-year-old girl died at Good Samaritan hospital here today of a gunshot wound received in a freak accident near Alsea last night.

The victim was Brendy Bliss, daughter of Mrs. Daniel Zandofsky.

The bullet passed through the ceiling into an upstairs bedroom, struck a bed where Brendy was sleeping between her two sisters and pierced the little girl's neck. She was rushed by ambulance to a Corvallis hospital.
