

Dorman Defends Department of Finance Before House Committee

Group Sees Report Showing Savings Made for State

Salem—(U.P.)—Harry Dorman and his State Department of Finance and Administration went on trial yesterday before the House Committee that is considering a bill that would abolish the department.

Dorman promptly handed the committee a copy of an accounting firm report which showed his department was saving the state some \$2,200,000 every biennium, more than double the amount it takes to operate all phases of the department.

Pearson Makes Accusation

Rep. Walter Pearson (D-Portland), one of the sponsors of the abolition bill, accused the department of taking over the functions of constitutional offices and of absorbing other state offices like a giant sponge. He said its budget has increased tremendously.

The budget for the department this year requests an appropriation of more than \$790,000. Last session the request was for \$575,442.

Rep. F. H. Dammasch (R-Portland), who joined Pearson in sponsoring the bill, said his reason for introducing the bill was to bring the facts about Dorman's operation into the open and to quiet rumors about the department's work. He said Dorman should be allowed to justify his budget request of more than three-quarters-of-a-million dollars. The department, Dammasch said, should have the wholehearted support of all state departments or the Legislature should correct its shortcomings.

Witnesses Presented

Dorman then presented to the committee a roomful of witnesses, businessmen and heads of state departments, who testified to their satisfaction with the Department of Finance and their respect for Dorman's budgetary and expense controls.

Dorman's witnesses included R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer; Mrs. Lea Howard Mason, administrator of the State Welfare Commission; Dr. John Richards, chancellor-elect of the state system of higher education; Dr. Harold Erickson, head of the State Board of Health; Mrs. Katherine Barsch, assistant attorney general; Charles Terry, state civil service director; Charles Heltzel, public utilities commissioner; George Spaur, state forester, and T. Morris Dunne, head of the unemployment compensation commission.

Costs Said Decreased
Dorman defended his budget requests with the claim that actual operation costs of his department have decreased and that apparent increases could be attributed to transfers from other departments of budgeted salaries of personnel doing work for the finance department and the purchase of equipment actually used in departments outside Dorman's.

Dorman testified that his office purchases materials for the state valued at \$35,000,000 per biennium and spread over 155,000 separate items. He conceded that mistakes may have been made, but he insisted the same mistake was never made twice. He said the cost of operating the department compared favorably with similar departments in Michigan and Minnesota where the volume of purchases was similar.

At the close of the hearing, Pearson admitted that Dorman's purchasing and budget divisions were doing a sound job, but he repeated his charge that the department was growing beyond control.

Vigorous opposition to House

Patterson Unaware of Republican Plans To Draft Him for Senate

Salem—(U.P.)—Gov. Paul Patterson said today he was too busy with legislative problems to think about future political plans and that he knew nothing of a reported Republican plan to draft him to run for the U. S. Senate next year.

The Seattle Times said yesterday that top GOP strategists want to draft Patterson and Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington to run for the Senate next year.

Patterson, presumably would oppose Sen. Wayne Morse and Langlie run against Democrat Warren G. Magnuson.

Langlie Denies Knowledge

Langlie, in Olympia, also denied knowledge of such plans. However, both left the door open for a possible draft at the request of President Eisenhower. Patterson and Langlie both visited the president recently. Both said he made no mention of any such plan.

Patterson said yesterday, however, "no American could refuse a request to do anything to assist the President in his work. But no such request has

been made of me." He added that his statement was "in no sense to be considered an announcement or indication concerning any future political plans. I have none at this time," he said.

"At present I am busy trying to help the Oregon Legislature with its deliberations and I have no thought as to the political future."

Langlie made a similar statement at Olympia.

He Would Campaign

The Times story said Mr. Eisenhower was reported to have said he would campaign in Oregon and Washington in behalf of Patterson and Langlie. The newspaper said the plan to draft the governors was worked out by Sherman Adams, presidential assistant, and Attorney General Herbert Brownell.

Oregon State GOP Chairman Ed Boehne said he knew nothing about the report. "We're not putting out anything on Republican candidates until the State Legislative session is over," he said.

Too Early Removal of Teeth Can Cause Dental Troubles

(Editor's note: This is the fifth in a series of six articles dealing with dental health. They are being published in cooperation with the Southern Oregon Dental Society in observance of National Children's Dental Health week, to be observed Feb. 7 to 13. The articles were prepared under the supervision of the American Dental Association.)

The "fairly godmother" who rewards a youngster for placing a tooth under his pillow at night may be doing the child grave harm. If a first tooth is removed or lost too soon, serious dental troubles can result.

The adjacent teeth may "drift" toward the opening left by the lost tooth, causing the succeeding permanent teeth to appear in the wrong place.

The unhappy result may be a severe case of highly irregular second teeth and an unsightly appearance. In order to avoid this faulty tooth alignment, dentists will sometimes recommend use of a space maintainer when certain primary teeth are lost prematurely.

Belief Causes Damage

The belief that a child's first teeth are not important "because they will fall out anyway" has produced much damage to both teeth and appearance.

From the standpoint of general health, the youngster cannot chew his food properly and

thoroughly with decayed teeth or if teeth are missing or if the teeth are badly out of position.

A child's first teeth usually begin to appear when the baby is between 6 and 8 months old. The first ones to come in are the two front teeth called central incisors. By the time he reaches 2 or 2½ years, he usually has all his 20 first teeth.

First Are Molars

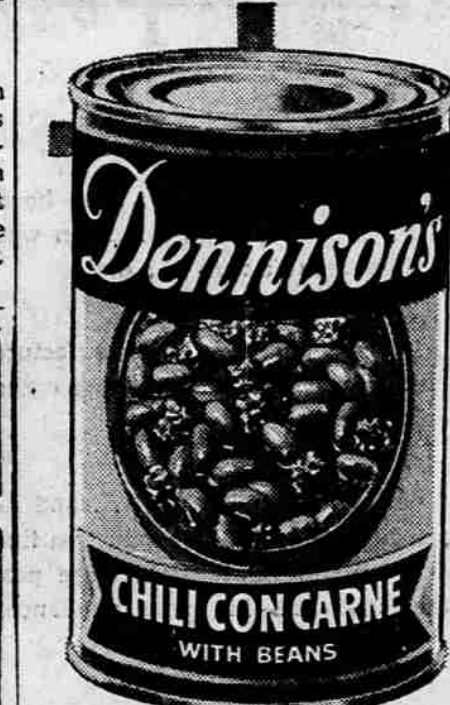
The permanent teeth begin to appear when the child is about 6 years old. Usually these are the four first permanent teeth or so-called "six-year molars." They do not replace any of the primary teeth but appear far back in the mouth, just behind the last of the primary molars.

There should be a word of caution about the six-year molars. Because they do not take the place of first teeth, parents often mistake them for so-called "baby teeth." These six-year molars are highly important as keys to the position of the rest of the child's permanent teeth and are often called "the keystones of the dental arch."

All of a child's permanent teeth generally appear by the time he is between 12 and 13 years old except for the permanent third molars or so-called "wisdom teeth." These four teeth ordinarily come in between the ages of 17 and 21.

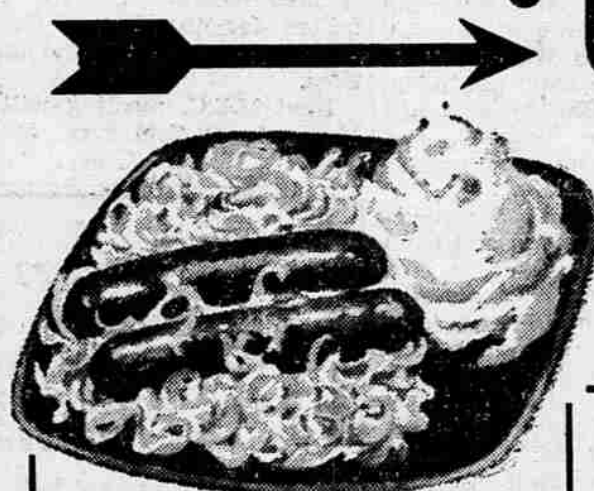
