Mrs. Jane Carpenter, president of the board, announced that Miss Mary Vandenberg, psychiatric social worker for the clinic, will attend the American Orthopsychiatric association meeting in Chicago Feb. 28 and March 1 and 2.

Work Increasing
The Clinic service report, given by Miss Vandenberg, showed that the number of children referred to the clinic is increasing each month, without a comparable increase in clinic staff personnel. It was reported that more parents are coming to the clinic directly for help with their children's problems. Formerly, parents brought their children to the clinic mainly upon the suggestion of doctors or school personnel.

The board approved of the division of staff time between direct service to children in diagnosis and treatment, and indirect service in the community to those who work directly with children.
