A Nichol's Worth of... Comment On This and That

Washington—(U.P.)—Franklin Roudybush, a nice little gent with rimless glasses, has just returned with some information about what is cooking in Pakistan.

He works for this government. The serious stuff was what you might call off the record. What he had to say about life in Pakistan was something else again. For instance, over there at Gilgit, Pakistan (look it up) is what you might say is the original polo field. Kids play the game afoot, instead of horseback. They use hockey sticks—like we did as kids when Salt Creek "frizz" over back there in Illinois.

Best Scenery
"Ought to see that country," Frank said, with a gleam in his eye. "Highest mountains in the world. Best scenery. Take the Nanga Parabat; 27,000 feet high. She is a dolly. They call her the 'Naked Lady.'"

Come to think of it, Frank said, while he was flying over the Naked Lady, something awful almost happened.

"We were sitting there in the aircraft," he said, "and the pilot came back to talk with us and while he was talking the copilot came back, too. And so everybody said, who was flying the airplane? Turned out nobody was. But everything turned out all right. We missed the 'Naked Lady' by a couple of thousand feet."

Frank rather liked Pakistan, though, and hopes to go back for a visit some day. Food was cheap, for one thing.

"We could get a five-course meal, like you might find at a big hotel here in Washington for about \$1.70," he said. "And if you stayed at a hotel for four or five days, it was proper to leave a little tip—although you could come back into society if you didn't drop a dime."

Ancient Customs
Pakistan, our man said, has folks that live like they did in the time of Christ. You can see women walking up the side of a hill with a bowl balanced on their hair-do.

"They have the finest irrigation system in the world," waters come down from the Himalayas—through five rivers—you can raise anything there. Wheat, rice, cotton, oranges, lemons, nuts and every kind of vegetable you can think of. There are lots of cattle, goats and sheep and the exporting of wool is important.

Frank reports that there is some sort of "trade" over the Iron Curtain.

Siberian ducks, it seems, aren't too smart. They fly over the curtain and get themselves shot down. Good eating, too.

Glass Jar Plant Planned at Portland

San Francisco—(U.P.)—The Owens-Illinois Glass company today, announced plans to build a two-furnace glass container manufacturing plant on a 70-acre site in the Parkrose area of Portland, Ore.

The new plant, one of the most modern of its kind on the West Coast, will be completed in the summer of 1956.

Four buildings, including the main factory, warehouse, batch house and compressor building, will be erected on an area which extends from 92nd to 99th avenues north of Columbia boulevard.
